SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Modifies date by which coordinated care organization must report to Oregon Health Authority proportion of total medical costs allocated to primary care.

Removes obsolete references to Office for Oregon Health Policy and Research **and community-based health care initiatives**. [*Creates Health Policy and Analytics Division of Oregon Health Authority.*]

2 Relating to health policy; amending ORS 243.061, 244.050, 441.221, 441.233, 442.011, 731.036, 743B.001,
3 743B.197 and 743B.200 and section 2, chapter 575, Oregon Laws 2015; and repealing ORS 735.721,
4 735.723, 735.725, 735.727 and 743B.206.

5 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

6 **SECTION 1.** Section 2, chapter 575, Oregon Laws 2015, is amended to read:

7 **Sec. 2.** (1) As used in this section:

8 (a) "Carrier" means an insurer that offers a health benefit plan, as defined in ORS 743B.005.

9 (b) "Coordinated care organization" has the meaning given that term in ORS 414.025.

10 (c) "Primary care" means family medicine, general internal medicine, naturopathic medicine,
11 obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics or general psychiatry.

12 (d) "Primary care provider" includes:

13 (A) A physician, naturopath, nurse practitioner, physician assistant or other health professional
14 licensed or certified in this state, whose clinical practice is in the area of primary care.

15 (B) A health care team or clinic that has been certified by the Oregon Health Authority as a
16 patient centered primary care home.

17 (2) The Oregon Health Authority shall convene a primary care payment reform collaborative to
18 advise and assist the authority in developing a Primary Care Transformation Initiative to develop
19 and share best practices in technical assistance and methods of reimbursement that direct greater
20 health care resources and investments toward supporting and facilitating health care innovation and
21 care improvement in primary care. The collaborative is a governing body, as defined in ORS 192.610.

22 (3) The authority shall invite representatives from all of the following to participate in the pri-
23 mary care payment reform collaborative:

24 (a) Primary care providers;

25 (b) Health care consumers;

26 (c) Experts in primary care contracting and reimbursement;

- 1 (d) Independent practice associations;
- 2 (e) Behavioral health treatment providers;
- 3 (f) Third party administrators;
- 4 (g) Employers that offer self-insured health benefit plans;
- 5 (h) The Department of Consumer and Business Services;
- 6 (i) Carriers;
- 7 (j) A statewide organization for mental health professionals who provide primary care;
- 8 (k) A statewide organization representing federally qualified health centers;
- 9 (L) A statewide organization representing hospitals and health systems;
- 10 (m) A statewide professional association for family physicians;
- 11 (n) A statewide professional association for physicians;
- 12 (o) A statewide professional association for nurses; and
- 13 (p) The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

14 (4) The authority shall convene the primary care payment reform collaborative no later than
15 October 1, 2015.

16 (5) A coordinated care organization shall report to the authority, no later than *[December 31,*
17 *2015]* **October 1 of each year**, the proportion of the organization's total medical costs that are al-
18 located to primary care.

19 (6) The authority, in collaboration with the Department of Consumer and Business Services,
20 shall adopt rules prescribing the primary care services for which costs must be reported under
21 subsection (5) of this section.

22 **SECTION 2.** ORS 442.011 is amended to read:

23 442.011. There is created in the Oregon Health Authority the *[Office for Oregon Health Policy*
24 *and Research]* **Health Policy and Analytics Division**. The *[Administrator of the Office for Oregon*
25 *Health Policy and Research]* **Director of the Health Policy and Analytics Division** shall be ap-
26 pointed by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority. The *[administrator]* **Director of the Health**
27 **Policy and Analytics Division** shall be an individual with demonstrated proficiency in planning and
28 managing programs with complex public policy and fiscal aspects such as those involved in the
29 medical assistance program.

30 **SECTION 3.** ORS 243.061 is amended to read:

31 243.061. (1) There is created in the Oregon Health Authority the Public Employees' Benefit
32 Board consisting of at least eight voting members and two members of the Legislative Assembly as
33 nonvoting advisory members. Two of the voting members are ex officio members and six are ap-
34 pointed by the Governor. The voting members shall be:

35 (a) Four members representing the state as an employer and management employees, who shall
36 be as follows:

37 (A) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority or a designee of the director;

38 *[(B) The Administrator of the Office for Oregon Health Policy and Research or a designee of the*
39 *administrator; and]*

40 **(B) The Director of the Health Policy and Analytics Division of the Oregon Health Au-**
41 **thority or the director's designee; and**

42 (C) Two management employees appointed by the Governor from areas of state government
43 other than the Oregon Health Authority *[or the Office for Oregon Health Policy and Research];* and

44 (b) Four members appointed by the Governor and representing nonmanagement representable
45 employees, who shall be as follows:

1 (A) Two persons from the largest employee representative unit;

2 (B) One person from the second largest employee representative unit; and

3 (C) One person from representable employees not represented by employee representative units
4 described in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this paragraph.

5 (2) One member of the Senate shall be appointed by the President of the Senate and one member
6 of the House of Representatives shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House to serve as non-
7 voting advisory members.

8 (3)(a) If the governing body of a local government elects to participate in a benefit plan offered
9 by the board, in addition to the members appointed under subsections (1) and (2) of this section, the
10 Governor shall appoint two voting members, one of whom represents local government management
11 and one of whom represents local government nonmanagement employees.

12 (b) After the appointment of members under paragraph (a) of this subsection, if the number of
13 eligible employees of a local government or local governments enrolled in a benefit plan or plans
14 offered by the board exceeds 25,000, the Governor shall appoint two additional voting members, one
15 of whom represents local government management and one of whom represents local government
16 nonmanagement employees.

17 (c) After the appointment of members under paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection, for every
18 additional 25,000 eligible employees of a local government or local governments enrolled in a benefit
19 plan or plans offered by the board, the Governor shall appoint one additional voting member repre-
20 senting local government management and one additional voting member representing local govern-
21 ment nonmanagement employees.

22 (4) A maximum of three members may be appointed to represent local government management
23 and a maximum of three members may be appointed to represent local government nonmanagement
24 employees.

25 (5) The term of office of each appointed voting member is four years, but an appointed voting
26 member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a voting mem-
27 ber appointed by the Governor, the Governor shall appoint a successor to take office upon the date
28 of that expiration. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the
29 Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

30 (6) The appointments by the Governor of voting members of the board are subject to confirma-
31 tion by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

32 (7) Members of the board who are not members of the Legislative Assembly shall receive no
33 compensation for their services, but shall be paid for their necessary and actual expenses while on
34 official business in accordance with ORS 292.495. Members of the board who are members of the
35 Legislative Assembly shall be paid compensation and expense reimbursement as provided in ORS
36 171.072, payable from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly.

37 (8) As used in this section, "benefit plan" and "local government" have the meanings given those
38 terms in ORS 243.105.

1 441.221. (1) The Advisory Committee on Physician Credentialing Information is established
2 within the Oregon Health Authority. The committee consists of nine members appointed by the Di-
3 rector of the Oregon Health Authority **or the director's designee** as follows:

4 (a) Three members who are health care practitioners licensed by the Oregon Medical Board or
5 representatives of health care practitioners' organizations doing business within the State of Oregon;

6 (b) Three representatives of hospitals licensed by the Oregon Health Authority; and

7 (c) Three representatives of health care service contractors that have been issued a certificate
8 of authority to transact health insurance in this state by the Department of Consumer and Business
