**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
SENATE BILL 801**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, before the period insert “; creating
2 new provisions; amending ORS 656.206, 656.218, 656.245, 656.247, 656.262,
3 656.264, 656.267, 656.268, 656.273, 656.277, 656.278, 656.283, 656.313, 656.325,
4 656.327, 656.331, 656.403, 656.407, 656.455, 656.752, 656.780 and 656.802; and
5 prescribing an effective date.”.

6 Delete lines 4 through 30 and delete page 2 and insert:

7 **“SECTION 1. ORS 656.206 is amended to read:**

8 “656.206. (1) As used in this section:

9 “(a) ‘Essential functions’ means the primary tasks associated with the job.

10 “(b) ‘Materially improved medically’ means an actual change for the bet-
11 ter in the worker’s medical condition that is supported by objective findings.

12 “(c) ‘Materially improved vocationally’ means an actual change for the
13 better in the:

14 “(A) Worker’s vocational capability; or

15 “(B) Likelihood that the worker can return to work in a gainful and
16 suitable occupation.

17 “(d) ‘Permanent total disability’ means, notwithstanding ORS 656.225, the
18 loss, including preexisting disability, of use or function of any portion of the
19 body which permanently incapacitates the worker from regularly performing
20 work at a gainful and suitable occupation.

21 “(e) ‘Regularly performing work’ means the ability of the worker to dis-

1 charge the essential functions of the job.

2 “(f) ‘Suitable occupation’ means one that the worker has the ability and
3 the training or experience to perform, or an occupation that the worker is
4 able to perform after rehabilitation.

5 “(g) ‘Wages’ means wages as determined under ORS 656.210.

6 “(2) If permanent total disability results from a worker’s injury, the
7 worker shall receive during the period of that disability compensation bene-
8 fits equal to 66-2/3 percent of wages, no more than 133 percent of the average
9 weekly wage or no less than 33 percent of the average weekly wage.

10 “(3) A worker has the burden of proving permanent total disability status
11 and must establish that the worker is willing to seek regular gainful em-
12 ployment and that the worker has made reasonable efforts to obtain such
13 employment.

14 “(4) When requested by the Director of the Department of Consumer and
15 Business Services, a worker who receives permanent total disability benefits
16 shall file on a form provided by the director, a sworn statement of the
17 worker’s gross annual income for the preceding year along with such other
18 information as the director considers necessary to determine whether the
19 worker regularly performs work at a gainful and suitable occupation.

20 “(5) Each insurer shall reexamine periodically each permanent total dis-
21 ability claim for which the insurer has current payment responsibility to
22 determine whether the worker has materially improved, either medically or
23 vocationally, and is no longer permanently incapacitated from regularly
24 performing work at a gainful and suitable occupation. Reexamination must
25 be conducted every two years or at such other more frequent interval as the
26 director may prescribe. Reexamination must include such medical examina-
27 tions, vocational evaluations, reports and other records as the insurer con-
28 siders necessary or the director may require.

29 “(6)(a) If a worker receiving permanent total disability benefits is found
30 to be materially improved and capable of regularly performing work at a

1 gainful and suitable occupation, the insurer or **the State Accident Insur-**
2 **ance Fund Corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, shall issue
3 a notice of closure pursuant to ORS 656.268. Permanent total disability ben-
4 efits shall be paid through the date of the notice of closure. Notwithstanding
5 ORS 656.268 (5), if a worker objects to a notice of closure issued under this
6 subsection, the worker shall request a hearing. If the worker requests a
7 hearing on the notice of closure before the Hearings Division of the Workers'
8 Compensation Board within 30 days of the date of the notice of closure, the
9 insurer or self-insured employer shall continue payment of permanent total
10 disability benefits until an order of the Hearings Division or a subsequent
11 order affirms the notice of closure or until another order that terminates the
12 worker's benefits becomes final. If the worker requests a hearing on the no-
13 tice of closure more than 30 days from the date of the notice of closure but
14 before the 60-day period for requesting a hearing expires, the insurer or
15 self-insured employer shall resume paying permanent total disability benefits
16 from the date the hearing is requested and shall continue payment of benefits
17 until an order of the Hearings Division or a subsequent order affirms the
18 notice of closure or until another order that terminates the worker's benefits
19 becomes final. If the notice of closure is upheld by the Hearings Division,
20 the insurer or self-insured employer must be reimbursed from the Workers'
21 Benefit Fund for the amount of permanent total disability benefits paid after
22 the date of the notice of closure issued under this subsection.

23 “(b) An insurer or self-insured employer must establish that the condition
24 of a worker who is receiving permanent total disability benefits has mate-
25 rially improved by a preponderance of the evidence presented at hearing.

26 “(c) Medical examinations or vocational evaluations used to support the
27 issuance of a notice of closure under this subsection must include at least
28 one report in which the author personally observed the worker.

29 “(d) Notwithstanding section 54 (3), chapter 2, Oregon Laws 1990, the
30 Hearings Division of the Workers' Compensation Board may request the di-

1 rector to order a medical arbiter examination of an injured worker who has
2 requested a hearing under this subsection.

3 “(7) A worker who has had permanent total disability benefits terminated
4 under this section by an order that has become final is eligible for vocational
5 assistance pursuant to ORS 656.340. Notwithstanding ORS 656.268 (10), if a
6 worker has enrolled in and is actively engaged in a training program, when
7 vocational assistance provided under this section ends or the worker ceases
8 to be enrolled and actively engaged in the training program, the insurer or
9 the **corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, shall determine
10 the extent of disability pursuant to ORS 656.214.

11 “(8) A worker receiving permanent total disability benefits is required, if
12 requested by the director, the insurer or the **corporation, on behalf of the**
13 self-insured employer, to submit to a vocational evaluation at a time rea-
14 sonably convenient to the worker as may be provided by the rules of the
15 director. No more than three evaluations may be requested except after no-
16 tification to and authorization by the director. If the worker refuses to sub-
17 mit to or obstructs a vocational evaluation, the rights of the worker to
18 compensation must be suspended with the consent of the director until the
19 evaluation has taken place, and no compensation is payable for the period
20 during which the worker refused to submit to or obstructed the evaluation.
21 The insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the costs of the evaluation and
22 related services that are reasonably necessary to allow the worker to attend
23 the evaluation requested under this subsection. As used in this subsection,
24 ‘related services’ includes, but is not limited to, wages, child care, travel,
25 meals and lodging.

26 “(9) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter, if a worker
27 receiving permanent total disability incurs a new compensable injury, the
28 worker’s entitlement to compensation for the new injury shall be limited to
29 medical benefits pursuant to ORS 656.245 and permanent partial disability
30 benefits for impairment, as determined in the manner set forth in ORS

1 656.214 (2).

2 “(10) When a worker eligible for benefits under this section returns to
3 work, if the combined total of the worker’s post-injury wages plus permanent
4 total disability benefit exceeds the worker’s wage at the time of injury, the
5 worker’s permanent total disability benefit must be reduced by the amount
6 the worker’s wages plus statutory permanent total disability benefit exceeds
7 the worker’s wage at injury.

8 “(11) For purposes of this section:

9 “(a) A gainful occupation for workers with a date of injury prior to Jan-
10 uary 1, 2006, who were:

11 “(A) Employed continuously for 52 weeks prior to the injury, is an occu-
12 pation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent
13 federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable to Oregon
14 residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
15 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent
16 of the worker’s average weekly wages from all employment for the 52 weeks
17 prior to the date of injury.

18 “(B) Not employed continuously for the 52 weeks prior to the date of in-
19 jury, but who were employed for at least four weeks prior to the date of in-
20 jury, is an occupation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the
21 most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are appli-
22 cable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal
23 Register by the United States Department of Health and Human Services or
24 66-2/3 percent of the worker’s average weekly wage from all employment for
25 the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury based on weeks of actual employ-
26 ment, excluding any extended periods of unemployment.

27 “(C) Employed for less than four weeks prior to the date of injury with
28 no other employment during the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, is an
29 occupation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent
30 federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable to Oregon

1 residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
2 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent
3 of the average weekly wages intended by the parties at the time of initial
4 hire.

5 “(b) A gainful occupation for workers with a date of injury on or after
6 January 1, 2006, who were:

7 “(A) Employed continuously for 52 weeks prior to the injury, is an occu-
8 pation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent
9 federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable to Oregon
10 residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
11 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent
12 of the worker’s average weekly wages from all employment for the 52 weeks
13 prior to the date of injury adjusted by the percentage of change in the ap-
14 plicable federal poverty guidelines for a family of three from the date of in-
15 jury to the date of evaluation of the extent of the worker’s disability.

16 “(B) Not employed continuously for the 52 weeks prior to the date of in-
17 jury, but who were employed for at least four weeks prior to the date of in-
18 jury, is an occupation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the
19 most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are appli-
20 cable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal
21 Register by the United States Department of Health and Human Services or
22 66-2/3 percent of the worker’s average weekly wage from all employment for
23 the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury based on weeks of actual employ-
24 ment, excluding any extended periods of unemployment and as adjusted by
25 the percentage of change in the applicable federal poverty guidelines for a
26 family of three from the date of injury to the date of evaluation of the extent
27 of the worker’s disability.

28 “(C) Employed for less than four weeks prior to the date of injury with
29 no other employment during the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, is an
30 occupation that provides weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent

1 federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable to Oregon
2 residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
3 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent
4 of the average weekly wages intended by the parties at the time of initial
5 hire adjusted by the percentage of change in the applicable federal poverty
6 guidelines for a family of three from the date of injury to the date of eval-
7 uation of the extent of the worker's disability.

8 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 656.218 is amended to read:

9 “656.218. (1) In case of the death of a worker entitled to compensation,
10 whether eligibility therefor or the amount thereof has been determined,
11 payments shall be made for the period during which the worker, if surviving,
12 would have been entitled thereto.

13 “(2) If the worker's death occurs prior to issuance of a notice of closure
14 under ORS 656.268, the insurer or the **State Accident Insurance Fund**
15 **Corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, shall determine com-
16 pensation for permanent partial disability, if any.

17 “(3) If the worker has filed a request for hearing pursuant to ORS 656.283
18 or a request for reconsideration pursuant to ORS 656.268 and death occurs
19 prior to the final disposition of the request, the persons described in sub-
20 section (5) of this section shall be entitled to pursue the matter to final de-
21 termination of all issues presented by the request.

22 “(4) If the worker dies before filing a request for hearing or a request for
23 reconsideration, the persons described in subsection (5) of this section shall
24 be entitled to file a request for hearing or a request for reconsideration and
25 to pursue the matter to final determination as to all issues presented by the
26 request.

27 “(5) The payments provided in this section shall be made to the persons
28 who would have been entitled to receive death benefits if the injury causing
29 the disability had been fatal. In the absence of persons so entitled, the un-
30 paid balance of the award shall be paid to the worker's estate.

1 “(6) This section does not entitle any person to double payments on ac-
2 count of the death of a worker and a continuation of payments for permanent
3 partial disability, or to a greater sum in the aggregate than if the injury had
4 been fatal.

5 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 656.245 is amended to read:

6 “656.245. (1)(a) For every compensable injury, the insurer or the self-
7 insured employer shall cause to be provided medical services for conditions
8 caused in material part by the injury for such period as the nature of the
9 injury or the process of the recovery requires, subject to the limitations in
10 ORS 656.225, including such medical services as may be required after a de-
11 termination of permanent disability. In addition, for consequential and com-
12 bined conditions described in ORS 656.005 (7), the insurer or the self-insured
13 employer shall cause to be provided only those medical services directed to
14 medical conditions caused in major part by the injury.

15 “(b) Compensable medical services shall include medical, surgical, hospi-
16 tal, nursing, ambulances and other related services, and drugs, medicine,
17 crutches and prosthetic appliances, braces and supports and where necessary,
18 physical restorative services. A pharmacist or dispensing physician shall
19 dispense generic drugs to the worker in accordance with ORS 689.515. The
20 duty to provide such medical services continues for the life of the worker.

21 “(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, medical services
22 after the worker’s condition is medically stationary are not compensable ex-
23 cept for the following:

24 “(A) Services provided to a worker who has been determined to be per-
25 manently and totally disabled.

26 “(B) Prescription medications.

27 “(C) Services necessary to administer prescription medication or monitor
28 the administration of prescription medication.

29 “(D) Prosthetic devices, braces and supports.

30 “(E) Services necessary to monitor the status, replacement or repair of

1 prosthetic devices, braces and supports.

2 “(F) Services provided pursuant to an accepted claim for aggravation un-
3 der ORS 656.273.

4 “(G) Services provided pursuant to an order issued under ORS 656.278.

5 “(H) Services that are necessary to diagnose the worker’s condition.

6 “(I) Life-preserving modalities similar to insulin therapy, dialysis and
7 transfusions.

8 “(J) With the approval of the insurer or **the State Accident Insurance**
9 **Fund Corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, palliative care
10 that the worker’s attending physician referred to in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A)
11 prescribes and that is necessary to enable the worker to continue current
12 employment or a vocational training program. If the insurer or **the corpo-**
13 **ration, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, does not approve, the at-
14 tending physician or the worker may request approval from the Director of
15 the Department of Consumer and Business Services for such treatment. The
16 director may order a medical review by a physician or panel of physicians
17 pursuant to ORS 656.327 (3) to aid in the review of such treatment. The de-
18 cision of the director is subject to review under ORS 656.704.

19 “(K) With the approval of the director, curative care arising from a gen-
20 erally recognized, nonexperimental advance in medical science since the
21 worker’s claim was closed that is highly likely to improve the worker’s
22 condition and that is otherwise justified by the circumstances of the claim.
23 The decision of the director is subject to review under ORS 656.704.

24 “(L) Curative care provided to a worker to stabilize a temporary and
25 acute waxing and waning of symptoms of the worker’s condition.

26 “(d) When the medically stationary date in a disabling claim is estab-
27 lished by the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured
28 employer, and is not based on the findings of the attending physician, the
29 insurer or self-insured employer is responsible for reimbursement to affected
30 medical service providers for otherwise compensable services rendered until

1 the insurer or self-insured employer provides written notice to the attending
2 physician of the worker's medically stationary status.

3 “(e) Except for services provided under a managed care contract, out-of-
4 pocket expense reimbursement to receive care from the attending physician
5 or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services
6 under this section shall not exceed the amount required to seek care from
7 an appropriate nurse practitioner or attending physician of the same spe-
8 cialty who is in a medical community geographically closer to the worker's
9 home. For the purposes of this paragraph, all physicians and nurse practi-
10 tioners within a metropolitan area are considered to be part of the same
11 medical community.

12 “(2)(a) The worker may choose an attending doctor, physician or nurse
13 practitioner within the State of Oregon. The worker may choose the initial
14 attending physician or nurse practitioner and may subsequently change at-
15 tending physician or nurse practitioner two times without approval from the
16 director. If the worker thereafter selects another attending physician or
17 nurse practitioner, the insurer or self-insured employer may require the
18 director's approval of the selection. The decision of the director is subject
19 to review under ORS 656.704. The worker also may choose an attending
20 doctor or physician in another country or in any state or territory or pos-
21 session of the United States with the prior approval of the insurer or self-
22 insured employer.

23 “(b) A medical service provider who is not a member of a managed care
24 organization is subject to the following provisions:

25 “(A) A medical service provider who is not qualified to be an attending
26 physician may provide compensable medical service to an injured worker for
27 a period of 30 days from the date of the first visit on the initial claim or for
28 12 visits, whichever first occurs, without the authorization of an attending
29 physician. Thereafter, medical service provided to an injured worker without
30 the written authorization of an attending physician is not compensable.

1 “(B) A medical service provider who is not an attending physician cannot
2 authorize the payment of temporary disability compensation. However, an
3 emergency room physician who is not authorized to serve as an attending
4 physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(c) may authorize temporary disability ben-
5 efits for a maximum of 14 days. A medical service provider qualified to serve
6 as an attending physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(B) may authorize the
7 payment of temporary disability compensation for a period not to exceed 30
8 days from the date of the first visit on the initial claim.

9 “(C) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, only a physician qual-
10 ified to serve as an attending physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A) or (B)(i)
11 who is serving as the attending physician at the time of claim closure may
12 make findings regarding the worker’s impairment for the purpose of evalu-
13 ating the worker’s disability.

14 “(D) Notwithstanding subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this paragraph, a
15 nurse practitioner licensed under ORS 678.375 to 678.390:

16 “(i) May provide compensable medical services for 180 days from the date
17 of the first visit on the initial claim;

18 “(ii) May authorize the payment of temporary disability benefits for a
19 period not to exceed 180 days from the date of the first visit on the initial
20 claim; and

21 “(iii) When an injured worker treating with a nurse practitioner author-
22 ized to provide compensable services under this section becomes medically
23 stationary within the 180-day period in which the nurse practitioner is au-
24 thorized to treat the injured worker, shall refer the injured worker to a
25 physician qualified to be an attending physician as defined in ORS 656.005
26 for the purpose of making findings regarding the worker’s impairment for the
27 purpose of evaluating the worker’s disability. If a worker returns to the
28 nurse practitioner after initial claim closure for evaluation of a possible
29 worsening of the worker’s condition, the nurse practitioner shall refer the
30 worker to an attending physician and the insurer shall compensate the nurse

1 practitioner for the examination performed.

2 “(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, the director, by
3 rule, upon the advice of the committee created by ORS 656.794 and upon the
4 advice of the professional licensing boards of practitioners affected by the
5 rule, may exclude from compensability any medical treatment the director
6 finds to be unscientific, unproven, outmoded or experimental. The decision
7 of the director is subject to review under ORS 656.704.

8 “(4) Notwithstanding subsection (2)(a) of this section, when a self-insured
9 employer or the insurer of an employer contracts with a managed care or-
10 ganization certified pursuant to ORS 656.260 for medical services required
11 by this chapter to be provided to injured workers:

12 “(a) Those workers who are subject to the contract shall receive medical
13 services in the manner prescribed in the contract. Workers subject to the
14 contract include those who are receiving medical treatment for an accepted
15 compensable injury or occupational disease, regardless of the date of injury
16 or medically stationary status, on or after the effective date of the contract.
17 If the managed care organization determines that the change in provider
18 would be medically detrimental to the worker, the worker shall not become
19 subject to the contract until the worker is found to be medically stationary,
20 the worker changes physicians or nurse practitioners, or the managed care
21 organization determines that the change in provider is no longer medically
22 detrimental, whichever event first occurs. A worker becomes subject to the
23 contract upon the worker’s receipt of actual notice of the worker’s enroll-
24 ment in the managed care organization, or upon the third day after the no-
25 tice was sent by regular mail by the insurer or self-insured employer,
26 whichever event first occurs. A worker shall not be subject to a contract
27 after it expires or terminates without renewal. A worker may continue to
28 treat with the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to pro-
29 vide compensable medical services under this section under an expired or
30 terminated managed care organization contract if the physician or nurse

1 practitioner agrees to comply with the rules, terms and conditions regarding
2 services performed under any subsequent managed care organization contract
3 to which the worker is subject. A worker shall not be subject to a contract
4 if the worker's primary residence is more than 100 miles outside the managed
5 care organization's certified geographical area. Each such contract must
6 comply with the certification standards provided in ORS 656.260. However,
7 a worker may receive immediate emergency medical treatment that is
8 compensable from a medical service provider who is not a member of the
9 managed care organization. Insurers or self-insured employers who contract
10 with a managed care organization for medical services shall give notice to
11 the workers of eligible medical service providers and such other information
12 regarding the contract and manner of receiving medical services as the di-
13 rector may prescribe. Notwithstanding any provision of law or rule to the
14 contrary, a worker of a noncomplying employer is considered to be subject
15 to a contract between the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation as a
16 processing agent or the assigned claims agent and a managed care organ-
17 ization.

18 “(b)(A) For initial or aggravation claims filed after June 7, 1995, the
19 insurer or self-insured employer may require an injured worker, on a case-
20 by-case basis, immediately to receive medical services from the managed care
21 organization.

22 “(B) If the insurer or self-insured employer gives notice that the worker
23 is required to receive treatment from the managed care organization, the
24 insurer or self-insured employer must guarantee that any reasonable and
25 necessary services so received, that are not otherwise covered by health in-
26 surance, will be paid as provided in ORS 656.248, even if the claim is denied,
27 until the worker receives actual notice of the denial or until three days after
28 the denial is mailed, whichever event first occurs. The worker may elect to
29 receive care from a primary care physician or nurse practitioner authorized
30 to provide compensable medical services under this section who agrees to the

1 conditions of ORS 656.260 (4)(g). However, guarantee of payment is not re-
2 quired by the insurer or self-insured employer if this election is made.

3 “(C) If the insurer or self-insured employer does not give notice that the
4 worker is required to receive treatment from the managed care organization,
5 the insurer or self-insured employer is under no obligation to pay for services
6 received by the worker unless the claim is later accepted.

7 “(D) If the claim is denied, the worker may receive medical services after
8 the date of denial from sources other than the managed care organization
9 until the denial is reversed. Reasonable and necessary medical services re-
10 ceived from sources other than the managed care organization after the date
11 of claim denial must be paid as provided in ORS 656.248 by the insurer or
12 self-insured employer if the claim is finally determined to be compensable.

13 “(5)(a) A nurse practitioner licensed under ORS 678.375 to 678.390 who is
14 not a member of the managed care organization is authorized to provide the
15 same level of services as a primary care physician as established by ORS
16 656.260 (4) if the nurse practitioner maintains the worker’s medical records
17 and with whom the worker has a documented history of treatment, if that
18 nurse practitioner agrees to refer the worker to the managed care organiza-
19 tion for any specialized treatment, including physical therapy, to be fur-
20 nished by another provider that the worker may require and if that nurse
21 practitioner agrees to comply with all the rules, terms and conditions re-
22 garding services performed by the managed care organization.

23 “(b) A nurse practitioner authorized to provide medical services to a
24 worker enrolled in the managed care organization may provide medical
25 treatment to the worker if the treatment is determined to be medically ap-
26 propriate according to the service utilization review process of the managed
27 care organization and may authorize temporary disability payments as pro-
28 vided in subsection (2)(b)(D) of this section. However, the managed care or-
29 ganization may authorize the nurse practitioner to provide medical services
30 and authorize temporary disability payments beyond the periods established

1 in subsection (2)(b)(D) of this section.

2 “(6) Subject to the provisions of ORS 656.704, if a claim for medical ser-
3 vices is disapproved, the injured worker, insurer or self-insured employer
4 may request administrative review by the director pursuant to ORS 656.260
5 or 656.327.

6 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 656.247 is amended to read:

7 “656.247. (1) Except for medical services provided to workers subject to
8 ORS 656.245 (4)(b)(B), payment for medical services provided to a subject
9 worker in response to an initial claim for a work-related injury or occupa-
10 tional disease from the date of the employer’s notice or knowledge of the
11 claim until the date the claim is accepted or denied shall be payable in ac-
12 cordance with subsection (4) of this section.

13 “(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, no payment shall be
14 due from the insurer or self-insured employer if the insurer or **the State**
15 **Accident Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured em-
16 ployer, denies the claim within 14 days of the date of the employer’s notice
17 or knowledge of the claim.

18 “(3)(a) Disputes about whether the medical services provided to treat the
19 claimed work-related injury or occupational disease under subsection (1) of
20 this section are excessive, inappropriate or ineffectual or are consistent with
21 the criteria in subsection (1) of this section shall be resolved by the Director
22 of the Department of Consumer and Business Services. The director may or-
23 der a medical review by a physician or panel of physicians pursuant to ORS
24 656.327 (3) to aid in the review of such services. If a party is dissatisfied
25 with the order of the director, the dissatisfied party may request review un-
26 der ORS 656.704 within 60 days of the date of the director’s order. The order
27 of the director may be modified only if it is not supported by substantial
28 evidence in the record or if it reflects an error of law.

29 “(b) Disputes about the amount of the fee or nonpayment of bills for
30 medical treatment and services pursuant to this section shall be resolved

1 pursuant to ORS 656.248.

2 “(c) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, when a claim is
3 settled pursuant to ORS 656.289 (4), all medical services payable under sub-
4 section (1) of this section that are provided on or before the date of denial
5 shall be paid in accordance with subsection (4) of this section. The insurer
6 or self-insured employer shall notify each affected service provider of the
7 results of the settlement.

8 “(4)(a) If the claim in which medical services are provided under sub-
9 section (1) of this section has not been accepted or denied and a health
10 benefit plan provides benefits to the worker, the health benefit plan shall
11 expedite preauthorizations and guarantee payment of expenses for medical
12 services provided prior to acceptance or denial of the claim according to the
13 terms, conditions and benefits of the plan.

14 “(b) If the claim for which medical services are provided under subsection
15 (1) of this section is accepted, after the claim has been accepted the insurer
16 or self-insured employer shall pay for the medical services provided for ac-
17 cepted conditions, including reimbursements for medical expenses,
18 copayments and deductibles paid by the injured worker or the health benefit
19 plan. Payments made under this subsection are subject to the fee schedules,
20 limitations and conditions of this chapter.

21 “(c) If the claim for which medical services are provided under subsection
22 (1) of this section is denied and a health benefit plan provides benefits to the
23 worker, after the claim is denied the health benefit plan shall pay for med-
24 ical services provided according to the terms, conditions and benefits of the
25 plan.

26 “(d) As used in this subsection, ‘health benefit plan’ has the meaning
27 given that term in ORS 743B.005 and also means self-insured benefit plans
28 and health benefit plans offered by the Oregon Educators Benefit Board and
29 the Public Employees’ Benefit Board.

30 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 656.262 is amended to read:

1 **“656.262. (1)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this sub-**
2 **section, processing of claims and providing compensation for a worker shall**
3 **be the responsibility of the insurer [or self-insured employer]. All employers**
4 **shall assist their insurers in processing claims as required in this chapter.**

5 **“(b) A self-insured employer that receives a claim for a compensable**
6 **injury or occupational disease from a subject worker shall immediately**
7 **forward the claim to the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation**
8 **for processing and acceptance or denial. Claim processing under this**
9 **paragraph must occur in accordance with the following conditions:**

10 **“(A) The corporation shall process the claim in the same manner**
11 **that the corporation processes claims from employers for which the**
12 **corporation is the insurer, except that the time within which the**
13 **self-insured employer must pay the first installment of compensation**
14 **does not begin until after the corporation has received the claim from**
15 **the self-insured employer.**

16 **“(B) The corporation is not and does not act as the self-insured**
17 **employer’s insurer and is not responsible for paying compensation to**
18 **a worker on behalf of the self-insured employer.**

19 **“(C) The self-insured employer shall pay compensation in accord-**
20 **ance with the terms of any decision of the corporation to accept the**
21 **claim and as otherwise provided in this chapter. The corporation shall**
22 **accept or deny a claim in accordance with the provisions of this**
23 **chapter and in the same manner in which the corporation accepts or**
24 **denies claims from employers for which the corporation is the insurer.**

25 **“(D) The corporation may charge and receive from the self-insured**
26 **employer compensation for the corporation’s expenses in providing**
27 **claim processing services. Unless the corporation and the self-insured**
28 **employer have agreed to other terms, the corporation may not charge**
29 **the self-insured employer more to process a claim than the equivalent**
30 **expenses the corporation would incur in processing a claim from an**

1 **employer for which the corporation is an insurer.**

2 “(2) The compensation due under this chapter shall be paid periodically,
3 promptly and directly to the person entitled thereto upon the employer’s re-
4 ceiving notice or knowledge of a claim, except where the right to compen-
5 sation is denied by the insurer or, **for a self-insured employer, by the**
6 **corporation.**

7 “(3)(a) Employers shall, immediately and not later than five days after
8 notice or knowledge of any claims or accidents [*which*] **that** may result in
9 a compensable injury claim, report the same to their insurer **or to the cor-**
10 **poration, as appropriate.** The report shall include:

11 “(A) The date, time, cause and nature of the accident and injuries.

12 “(B) Whether the accident arose out of and in the course of employment.

13 “(C) Whether the employer recommends or opposes acceptance of the
14 claim, and the reasons therefor.

15 “(D) The name and address of any health insurance provider for the in-
16 jured worker.

17 “(E) Any other details the insurer may require.

18 “(b) Failure to so report subjects the offending employer to a charge for
19 reimbursing the insurer for any penalty the insurer is required to pay under
20 subsection (11) of this section because of such failure. As used in this sub-
21 section, ‘health insurance’ has the meaning for that term provided in ORS
22 731.162.

23 “(4)(a) The first installment of temporary disability compensation shall
24 be paid no later than the 14th day after the subject employer has notice or
25 knowledge of the claim and of the worker’s disability, if the attending phy-
26 sician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical ser-
27 vices under ORS 656.245 authorizes the payment of temporary disability
28 compensation. Thereafter, temporary disability compensation shall be paid
29 at least once each two weeks, except where the Director of the Department
30 of Consumer and Business Services determines that payment in installments

1 should be made at some other interval. The director may by rule convert
2 monthly benefit schedules to weekly or other periodic schedules.

3 “(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, if a self-insured
4 employer pays to an injured worker who becomes disabled the same wage at
5 the same pay interval that the worker received at the time of injury, such
6 payment shall be deemed timely payment of temporary disability payments
7 pursuant to ORS 656.210 and 656.212 during the time the wage payments are
8 made.

9 “(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, when the holder
10 of a public office is injured in the course and scope of that public office, full
11 official salary paid to the holder of that public office shall be deemed timely
12 payment of temporary disability payments pursuant to ORS 656.210 and
13 656.212 during the time the wage payments are made. As used in this sub-
14 section, ‘public office’ has the meaning for that term provided in ORS
15 260.005.

16 “(d) Temporary disability compensation is not due and payable for any
17 period of time for which the insurer or self-insured employer has requested
18 from the worker’s attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to
19 provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 verification of the
20 worker’s inability to work resulting from the claimed injury or disease and
21 the physician or nurse practitioner cannot verify the worker’s inability to
22 work, unless the worker has been unable to receive treatment for reasons
23 beyond the worker’s control.

24 “(e) If a worker fails to appear at an appointment with the worker’s at-
25 tending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable
26 medical services under ORS 656.245, the insurer or self-insured employer
27 shall notify the worker by certified mail that temporary disability benefits
28 may be suspended after the worker fails to appear at a rescheduled appoint-
29 ment. If the worker fails to appear at a rescheduled appointment, the insurer
30 or self-insured employer may suspend payment of temporary disability bene-

1 fits to the worker until the worker appears at a subsequent rescheduled ap-
2 pointment.

3 “(f) If the insurer or self-insured employer has requested and failed to
4 receive from the worker’s attending physician or nurse practitioner author-
5 ized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 verification
6 of the worker’s inability to work resulting from the claimed injury or dis-
7 ease, medical services provided by the attending physician or nurse practi-
8 tioner are not compensable until the attending physician or nurse
9 practitioner submits such verification.

10 “(g) Temporary disability compensation is not due and payable pursuant
11 to ORS 656.268 after the worker’s attending physician or nurse practitioner
12 authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 ceases
13 to authorize temporary disability or for any period of time not authorized
14 by the attending physician or nurse practitioner. No authorization of tem-
15 porary disability compensation by the attending physician or nurse practi-
16 tioner under ORS 656.268 shall be effective to retroactively authorize the
17 payment of temporary disability more than 14 days prior to its issuance.

18 “(h) The worker’s disability may be authorized only by a person described
19 in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(B) or 656.245 for the period of time permitted by those
20 sections. The insurer or self-insured employer may unilaterally suspend pay-
21 ment of temporary disability benefits to the worker at the expiration of the
22 period until temporary disability is reauthorized by an attending physician
23 or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services
24 under ORS 656.245.

25 “(i) The insurer or self-insured employer may unilaterally suspend pay-
26 ment of all compensation to a worker enrolled in a managed care organiza-
27 tion if the worker continues to seek care from an attending physician or
28 nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under
29 ORS 656.245 that is not authorized by the managed care organization more
30 than seven days after the mailing of notice by the insurer or self-insured

1 employer.

2 “(5)(a) Payment of compensation under subsection (4) of this section or
3 payment, in amounts per claim not to exceed the maximum amount estab-
4 lished annually by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business
5 Services, for medical services for nondisabling claims, may be made by the
6 subject employer if the employer so chooses. The making of such payments
7 does not constitute a waiver or transfer of the insurer’s duty to determine
8 entitlement to benefits. If the employer chooses to make such payment, the
9 employer shall report the injury to the insurer in the same manner that
10 other injuries are reported. However, an insurer shall not modify an
11 employer’s experience rating or otherwise make charges against the employer
12 for any medical expenses paid by the employer pursuant to this subsection.

13 “(b) To establish the maximum amount an employer may pay for medical
14 services for nondisabling claims under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the
15 director shall use \$1,500 as the base compensation amount and shall adjust
16 the base compensation amount annually to reflect changes in the United
17 States City Average Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for
18 Medical Care for July of each year as published by the Bureau of Labor
19 Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. The adjustment shall
20 be rounded to the nearest multiple of \$100.

21 “(c) The adjusted amount established under paragraph (b) of this sub-
22 section shall be effective on January 1 following the establishment of the
23 amount and shall apply to claims with a date of injury on or after the ef-
24 fective date of the adjusted amount.

25 “(6)(a) Written notice of acceptance or denial of the claim shall be fur-
26 nished to the claimant by the insurer or [*self-insured employer*] **the corpo-**
27 **ration** within 60 days after the employer has notice or knowledge of the
28 claim. Once the claim is accepted, the insurer or **the corporation, on be-**
29 **half of a** self-insured employer, shall not revoke acceptance except as pro-
30 vided in this section. The insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a**

1 self-insured employer, may revoke acceptance and issue a denial at any time
2 when the denial is for fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal activity by
3 the worker. If the worker requests a hearing on any revocation of acceptance
4 and denial alleging fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal activity, the
5 insurer or self-insured employer has the burden of proving, by a preponder-
6 ance of the evidence, such fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal activity.
7 Upon such proof, the worker then has the burden of proving, by a prepon-
8 derance of the evidence, the compensability of the claim. If the insurer or
9 **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, accepts a claim in
10 good faith, in a case not involving fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal
11 activity by the worker, and later obtains evidence that the claim is not
12 compensable or evidence that the insurer or self-insured employer is not re-
13 sponsible for the claim, the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the**
14 self-insured employer, may revoke the claim acceptance and issue a formal
15 notice of claim denial, if such revocation of acceptance and denial is issued
16 no later than two years after the date of the initial acceptance. If the worker
17 requests a hearing on such revocation of acceptance and denial, the insurer
18 or self-insured employer must prove, by a preponderance of the evidence, that
19 the claim is not compensable or that the insurer or self-insured employer is
20 not responsible for the claim. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
21 chapter, if a denial of a previously accepted claim is set aside by an Ad-
22 ministrative Law Judge, the Workers' Compensation Board or the court,
23 temporary total disability benefits are payable from the date any such bene-
24 fits were terminated under the denial. Except as provided in ORS 656.247,
25 pending acceptance or denial of a claim, compensation payable to a claimant
26 does not include the costs of medical benefits or funeral expenses. The
27 insurer **or the corporation, as appropriate,** shall also furnish the employer
28 a copy of the notice of acceptance.

29 “(b) The notice of acceptance shall:

30 “(A) Specify what conditions are compensable.

1 “(B) Advise the claimant whether the claim is considered disabling or
2 nondisabling.

3 “(C) Inform the claimant of the Expedited Claim Service and of the
4 hearing and aggravation rights concerning nondisabling injuries, including
5 the right to object to a decision that the injury of the claimant is
6 nondisabling by requesting reclassification pursuant to ORS 656.277.

7 “(D) Inform the claimant of employment reinstatement rights and re-
8 sponsibilities under ORS chapter 659A.

9 “(E) Inform the claimant of assistance available to employers and workers
10 from the Reemployment Assistance Program under ORS 656.622.

11 “(F) Be modified by the insurer or self-insured employer from time to time
12 as medical or other information changes a previously issued notice of ac-
13 ceptance.

14 “(c) An insurer’s [*or self-insured employer’s*] acceptance, **or the**
15 **corporation’s acceptance on behalf of a self-insured employer**, of a
16 combined or consequential condition under ORS 656.005 (7), whether volun-
17 tary or as a result of a judgment or order, shall not preclude the insurer or
18 **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, from later denying
19 the combined or consequential condition if the otherwise compensable injury
20 ceases to be the major contributing cause of the combined or consequential
21 condition.

22 “(d) An injured worker who believes that a condition has been incorrectly
23 omitted from a notice of acceptance, or that the notice is otherwise deficient,
24 first must communicate in writing to the insurer or [*self-insured employer*]
25 **the corporation, as appropriate**, the worker’s objections to the notice
26 pursuant to ORS 656.267. The insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the**
27 self-insured employer, has 60 days from receipt of the communication from
28 the worker to revise the notice or to make other written clarification in re-
29 sponse. A worker who fails to comply with the communication requirements
30 of this paragraph or ORS 656.267 may not allege at any hearing or other

1 proceeding on the claim a de facto denial of a condition based on information
2 in the notice of acceptance from the insurer or **from the corporation, on**
3 **behalf of the** self-insured employer. Notwithstanding any other provision
4 of this chapter, the worker may initiate objection to the notice of acceptance
5 at any time.

6 “(7)(a) After claim acceptance, written notice of acceptance or denial of
7 claims for aggravation or new medical or omitted condition claims properly
8 initiated pursuant to ORS 656.267 shall be furnished to the claimant by the
9 insurer or, **by the corporation on behalf of the** self-insured employer,
10 within 60 days after the insurer or self-insured employer receives written
11 notice of such claims, **except that the time limit begins on the date that**
12 **the corporation receives notice of the claim from the self-insured em-**
13 **ployer.** A worker who fails to comply with the communication requirements
14 of subsection (6) of this section or ORS 656.267 may not allege at any hearing
15 or other proceeding on the claim a de facto denial of a condition based on
16 information in the notice of acceptance from the insurer or **the corporation**
17 **on behalf of the** self-insured employer.

18 “(b) Once a worker’s claim has been accepted, the insurer or **the corpo-**
19 **ration, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, must issue a written denial
20 to the worker when the accepted injury is no longer the major contributing
21 cause of the worker’s combined condition before the claim may be closed.

22 “(c) When an insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured
23 employer, determines that the claim qualifies for claim closure, the insurer
24 or [*self-insured employer*] **the corporation** shall issue at claim closure an
25 updated notice of acceptance that specifies which conditions are
26 compensable. The procedures specified in subsection (6)(d) of this section
27 apply to this notice. Any objection to the updated notice or appeal of denied
28 conditions shall not delay claim closure pursuant to ORS 656.268. If a con-
29 dition is found compensable after claim closure, the insurer or **the corpo-**
30 **ration, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, shall reopen the claim for

1 processing regarding that condition.

2 “(8) The assigned claims agent in processing claims under ORS 656.054
3 shall send notice of acceptance or denial to the noncomplying employer.

4 “(9) If an insurer, **the corporation** or any other duly authorized agent
5 of the employer for such purpose, on record with the Director of the De-
6 partment of Consumer and Business Services denies a claim for compen-
7 sation, written notice of such denial, stating the reason for the denial, and
8 informing the worker of the Expedited Claim Service and of hearing rights
9 under ORS 656.283, shall be given to the claimant. A copy of the notice of
10 denial shall be mailed to the director and to the employer by the insurer **or**
11 **the corporation, on behalf of a self-insured employer, as appropriate.**
12 The worker may request a hearing pursuant to ORS 656.319.

13 “(10) Merely paying or providing compensation shall not be considered
14 acceptance of a claim or an admission of liability, nor shall mere acceptance
15 of such compensation be considered a waiver of the right to question the
16 amount thereof. Payment of permanent disability benefits pursuant to a no-
17 tice of closure, reconsideration order or litigation order, or the failure to
18 appeal or seek review of such an order or notice of closure, shall not pre-
19 clude an insurer or self-insured employer from subsequently contesting the
20 compensability of the condition rated therein, unless the condition has been
21 formally accepted.

22 “(11)(a) If the insurer or self-insured employer unreasonably delays or
23 unreasonably refuses to pay compensation, attorney fees or costs, or **if the**
24 **insurer or the corporation, on behalf of the self-insured employer,** un-
25 reasonably delays acceptance or denial of a claim, the insurer or self-insured
26 employer shall be liable for an additional amount up to 25 percent of the
27 amounts then due plus any attorney fees assessed under this section. The fees
28 assessed by the director, an Administrative Law Judge, the board or the
29 court under this section shall be reasonable attorney fees. In assessing fees,
30 the director, an Administrative Law Judge, the board or the court shall

1 consider the proportionate benefit to the injured worker. The board shall
2 adopt rules for establishing the amount of the attorney fee, giving primary
3 consideration to the results achieved and to the time devoted to the case.
4 An attorney fee awarded pursuant to this subsection may not exceed \$4,000
5 absent a showing of extraordinary circumstances. The maximum attorney fee
6 awarded under this paragraph shall be adjusted annually on July 1 by the
7 same percentage increase as made to the average weekly wage defined in
8 ORS 656.211, if any. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, the
9 director shall have exclusive jurisdiction over proceedings regarding solely
10 the assessment and payment of the additional amount and attorney fees de-
11 scribed in this subsection. The action of the director and the review of the
12 action taken by the director shall be subject to review under ORS 656.704.
13 **A self-insured employer may seek compensation from the corporation**
14 **if the corporation's unreasonable delay resulted in liability to the**
15 **self-insured employer under this paragraph.**

16 “(b) When the director does not have exclusive jurisdiction over pro-
17 ceedings regarding the assessment and payment of the additional amount and
18 attorney fees described in this subsection, the provisions of this subsection
19 shall apply in the other proceeding.

20 “(12)(a) If payment is due on a disputed claim settlement authorized by
21 ORS 656.289 and the insurer or self-insured employer has failed to make the
22 payment in accordance with the requirements specified in the disputed claim
23 settlement, the claimant or the claimant's attorney shall clearly notify the
24 insurer or self-insured employer in writing that the payment is past due. If
25 the required payment is not made within five business days after receipt of
26 the notice by the insurer or self-insured employer, the director may assess
27 a penalty and attorney fee in accordance with a matrix adopted by the di-
28 rector by rule.

29 “(b) The director shall adopt by rule a matrix for the assessment of the
30 penalties and attorney fees authorized under this subsection. The matrix

1 shall provide for penalties based on a percentage of the settlement proceeds
2 allocated to the claimant and for attorney fees based on a percentage of the
3 settlement proceeds allocated to the claimant's attorney as an attorney fee.

4 “(13) The insurer may authorize an employer to pay compensation to in-
5 jured workers and shall reimburse employers for compensation so paid.

6 “(14)(a) Injured workers have the duty to cooperate and assist the insurer
7 or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, in the investi-
8 gation of claims for compensation. Injured workers shall submit to and shall
9 fully cooperate with personal and telephonic interviews and other formal or
10 informal information gathering techniques. Injured workers who are repres-
11 ented by an attorney shall have the right to have the attorney present during
12 any personal or telephonic interview or deposition. If the injured worker is
13 represented by an attorney, the insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the
14 attorney a reasonable attorney fee based upon an hourly rate for actual time
15 spent during the personal or telephonic interview or deposition. After con-
16 sultation with the Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar, the Workers'
17 Compensation Board shall adopt rules for the establishment, assessment and
18 enforcement of an hourly attorney fee rate specified in this subsection.

19 “(b) If the attorney is not willing or available to participate in an inter-
20 view at a time reasonably chosen by the insurer or **the corporation, on**
21 **behalf of the** self-insured employer, within 14 days of the request for inter-
22 view and the insurer or [*self-insured employer*] **the corporation** has cause
23 to believe that the attorney's unwillingness or unavailability is unreasonable
24 and is preventing the worker from complying within 14 days of the request
25 for interview, the insurer or [*self-insured employer*] **the corporation** shall
26 notify the director. If the director determines that the attorney's unwilling-
27 ness or unavailability is unreasonable, the director shall assess a civil pen-
28 alty against the attorney of not more than \$1,000.

29 “(15) If the director finds that a worker fails to reasonably cooperate with
30 an investigation involving an initial claim to establish a compensable injury

1 or an aggravation claim to reopen the claim for a worsened condition, the
2 director shall suspend all or part of the payment of compensation after notice
3 to the worker. If the worker does not cooperate for an additional 30 days
4 after the notice, the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-
5 insured employer, may deny the claim because of the worker's failure to co-
6 operate. The obligation of the insurer or [*self-insured employer*] **the**
7 **corporation** to accept or deny the claim within 60 days is suspended during
8 the time of the worker's noncooperation. After such a denial, the worker
9 shall not be granted a hearing or other proceeding under this chapter on the
10 merits of the claim unless the worker first requests and establishes at an
11 expedited hearing under ORS 656.291 that the worker fully and completely
12 cooperated with the investigation, that the worker failed to cooperate for
13 reasons beyond the worker's control or that the investigative demands were
14 unreasonable. If the Administrative Law Judge finds that the worker has not
15 fully cooperated, the Administrative Law Judge shall affirm the denial, and
16 the worker's claim for injury shall remain denied. If the Administrative Law
17 Judge finds that the worker has cooperated, or that the investigative de-
18 mands were unreasonable, the Administrative Law Judge shall set aside the
19 denial, order the reinstatement of interim compensation if appropriate and
20 remand the claim to the insurer or **the corporation, as appropriate,** [*self-*
21 *insured employer*] to accept or deny the claim.

22 “(16) In accordance with ORS 656.283 (3), the Administrative Law Judge
23 assigned a request for hearing for a claim for compensation involving more
24 than one potentially responsible employer or insurer may specify what is
25 required of an injured worker to reasonably cooperate with the investigation
26 of the claim as required by subsection (14) of this section.

27 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 656.264 is amended to read:

28 “656.264. (1) Insurers and self-insured employers shall report to the Di-
29 rector of the Department of Consumer and Business Services compensable
30 injuries, denied claims, claims disposition and payments [*made by them*] **the**

1 **insurers or the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf**
2 **of a self-insured employer, made** under this chapter.

3 “(2) The director may require insurers and self-insured employers to re-
4 port other information as required to carry out this chapter.

5 “(3) The director may prescribe the interval and the form of such reports
6 and establish sanctions for the enforcement of reporting requirements.

7 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 656.267 is amended to read:

8 “656.267. (1) To initiate omitted medical condition claims under ORS
9 656.262 (6)(d) or new medical condition claims under this section, the worker
10 must clearly request formal written acceptance of a new medical condition
11 or an omitted medical condition from the insurer or **from the State Acci-**
12 **dent Insurance Fund Corporation on behalf of a** self-insured employer.
13 A claim for a new medical condition or an omitted condition is not made by
14 the receipt of medical billings, nor by requests for authorization to provide
15 medical services for the new or omitted condition, nor by actually providing
16 such medical services. The insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the**
17 **self-insured employer,** is not required to accept each and every diagnosis or
18 medical condition with particularity, as long as the acceptance tendered
19 reasonably apprises the claimant and the medical providers of the nature of
20 the compensable conditions. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
21 chapter, the worker may initiate a new medical or omitted condition claim
22 at any time.

23 “(2)(a) Claims properly initiated for new medical conditions and omitted
24 medical conditions related to an initially accepted claim shall be processed
25 pursuant to ORS 656.262.

26 “(b) If an insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured em-
27 ployer, denies a claim for a new medical or omitted medical condition, the
28 claimant may request a hearing on the denial pursuant to ORS 656.283.

29 “(3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, claims for new medical
30 or omitted medical conditions related to an initially accepted claim that have

1 been determined to be compensable and that were initiated after the rights
2 under ORS 656.273 expired shall be processed as requests for relief under the
3 Workers' Compensation Board's own motion jurisdiction pursuant to ORS
4 656.278 (1)(b).

5 **“SECTION 8.** ORS 656.268 is amended to read:

6 “656.268. (1) One purpose of this chapter is to restore the injured worker
7 as soon as possible and as near as possible to a condition of self support and
8 maintenance as an able-bodied worker. The insurer or **the State Accident**
9 **Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, shall
10 close the worker's claim, as prescribed by the Director of the Department
11 of Consumer and Business Services, and determine the extent of the worker's
12 permanent disability, provided the worker is not enrolled and actively en-
13 gaged in training according to rules adopted by the director pursuant to ORS
14 656.340 and 656.726, when:

15 “(a) The worker has become medically stationary and there is sufficient
16 information to determine permanent disability;

17 “(b) The accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the
18 worker's combined or consequential condition or conditions pursuant to ORS
19 656.005 (7). When the claim is closed because the accepted injury is no longer
20 the major contributing cause of the worker's combined or consequential
21 condition or conditions, and there is sufficient information to determine
22 permanent disability, the likely permanent disability that would have been
23 due to the current accepted condition shall be estimated;

24 “(c) Without the approval of the attending physician or nurse practitioner
25 authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245, the
26 worker fails to seek medical treatment for a period of 30 days or the worker
27 fails to attend a closing examination, unless the worker affirmatively estab-
28 lishes that such failure is attributable to reasons beyond the worker's con-
29 trol; or

30 “(d) An insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured em-

1 ployer, finds that a worker who has been receiving permanent total disability
2 benefits has materially improved and is capable of regularly performing work
3 at a gainful and suitable occupation.

4 “(2) If the worker is enrolled and actively engaged in training according
5 to rules adopted pursuant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726, the temporary disa-
6 bility compensation shall be proportionately reduced by any sums earned
7 during the training.

8 “(3) A copy of all medical reports and reports of vocational rehabilitation
9 agencies or counselors shall be furnished to the worker, if requested by the
10 worker.

11 “(4) Temporary total disability benefits shall continue until whichever of
12 the following events first occurs:

13 “(a) The worker returns to regular or modified employment;

14 “(b) The attending physician or nurse practitioner who has authorized
15 temporary disability benefits for the worker under ORS 656.245 advises the
16 worker and documents in writing that the worker is released to return to
17 regular employment;

18 “(c) The attending physician or nurse practitioner who has authorized
19 temporary disability benefits for the worker under ORS 656.245 advises the
20 worker and documents in writing that the worker is released to return to
21 modified employment, such employment is offered in writing to the worker
22 and the worker fails to begin such employment. However, an offer of modi-
23 fied employment may be refused by the worker without the termination of
24 temporary total disability benefits if the offer:

25 “(A) Requires a commute that is beyond the physical capacity of the
26 worker according to the worker’s attending physician or the nurse practi-
27 tioner who may authorize temporary disability under ORS 656.245;

28 “(B) Is at a work site more than 50 miles one way from where the worker
29 was injured unless the site is less than 50 miles from the worker’s residence
30 or the intent of the parties at the time of hire or as established by the pat-

1 tern of employment prior to the injury was that the employer had multiple
2 or mobile work sites and the worker could be assigned to any such site;

3 “(C) Is not with the employer at injury;

4 “(D) Is not at a work site of the employer at injury;

5 “(E) Is not consistent with the existing written shift change policy or is
6 not consistent with common practice of the employer at injury or aggra-
7 vation; or

8 “(F) Is not consistent with an existing shift change provision of an ap-
9 plicable collective bargaining agreement;

10 “(d) Any other event that causes temporary disability benefits to be law-
11 fully suspended, withheld or terminated under ORS 656.262 (4) or other pro-
12 visions of this chapter; or

13 “(e) Notwithstanding paragraph (c)(C), (D), (E) and (F) of this subsection,
14 the attending physician or nurse practitioner who has authorized temporary
15 disability benefits under ORS 656.245 for a home care worker or a personal
16 support worker who has been made a subject worker pursuant to ORS 656.039
17 advises the home care worker or personal support worker and documents in
18 writing that the home care worker or personal support worker is released
19 to return to modified employment, appropriate modified employment is of-
20 fered in writing by the Home Care Commission or a designee of the com-
21 mission to the home care worker or personal support worker for any client
22 of the Department of Human Services who employs a home care worker or
23 personal support worker and the worker fails to begin the employment.

24 “(5)(a) Findings by the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the**
25 self-insured employer, regarding the extent of the worker’s disability in clo-
26 sure of the claim shall be pursuant to the standards prescribed by the di-
27 rector.

28 “(b) The insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured em-
29 ployer, shall issue a notice of closure of the claim to the worker, to the
30 worker’s attorney if the worker is represented, and to the director. If the

1 worker is deceased at the time the notice of closure is issued, the insurer
2 or [*self-insured employer*] **the corporation** shall mail the worker's copy of
3 the notice of closure, addressed to the estate of the worker, to the worker's
4 last known address and may mail copies of the notice of closure to any
5 known or potential beneficiaries to the estate of the deceased worker.

6 “(c) The notice of closure must inform:

7 “(A) The parties, in boldfaced type, of the proper manner in which to
8 proceed if they are dissatisfied with the terms of the notice of closure;

9 “(B) The worker of:

10 “(i) The amount of any further compensation, including permanent disa-
11 bility compensation to be awarded;

12 “(ii) The duration of temporary total or temporary partial disability
13 compensation;

14 “(iii) The right of the worker or beneficiaries of the worker who were
15 mailed a copy of the notice of closure under paragraph (b) of this subsection
16 to request reconsideration by the director under this section within 60 days
17 of the date of the notice of closure;

18 “(iv) The right of beneficiaries who were not mailed a copy of the notice
19 of closure under paragraph (b) of this subsection to request reconsideration
20 by the director under this section within one year of the date the notice of
21 closure was mailed to the estate of the worker under paragraph (b) of this
22 subsection;

23 “(v) The right of the insurer or self-insured employer to request recon-
24 sideration by the director under this section within seven days of the date
25 of the notice of closure;

26 “(vi) The aggravation rights; and

27 “(vii) Any other information as the director may require; and

28 “(C) Any beneficiaries of death benefits to which they may be entitled
29 pursuant to ORS 656.204 and 656.208.

30 “(d) If the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured

1 employer, has not issued a notice of closure, the worker may request closure.
2 Within 10 days of receipt of a written request from the worker, the insurer
3 or [*self-insured employer*] **the corporation** shall issue a notice of closure if
4 the requirements of this section have been met or a notice of refusal to close
5 if the requirements of this section have not been met. A notice of refusal to
6 close shall advise the worker of:

7 “(A) The decision not to close;

8 “(B) The right of the worker to request a hearing pursuant to ORS 656.283
9 within 60 days of the date of the notice of refusal to close;

10 “(C) The right to be represented by an attorney; and

11 “(D) Any other information as the director may require.

12 “(e) If a worker, a worker’s beneficiary, an insurer or a self-insured em-
13 ployer objects to the notice of closure, the objecting party first must request
14 reconsideration by the director under this section. A worker’s request for
15 reconsideration must be made within 60 days of the date of the notice of
16 closure. If the worker is deceased at the time the notice of closure is issued,
17 a request for reconsideration by a beneficiary of the worker who was mailed
18 a copy of the notice of closure under paragraph (b) of this subsection must
19 be made within 60 days of the date of the notice of closure. A request for
20 reconsideration by a beneficiary to the estate of a deceased worker who was
21 not mailed a copy of the notice of closure under paragraph (b) of this sub-
22 section must be made within one year of the date the notice of closure was
23 mailed to the estate of the worker under paragraph (b) of this subsection.
24 A request for reconsideration by an insurer or **by the corporation, on be-**
25 **half of a** self-insured employer, may be based only on disagreement with the
26 findings used to rate impairment and must be made within seven days of the
27 date of the notice of closure.

28 “(f) If an insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured em-
29 ployer, has closed a claim or refused to close a claim pursuant to this sec-
30 tion, if the correctness of that notice of closure or refusal to close is at issue

1 in a hearing on the claim and if a finding is made at the hearing that the
2 notice of closure or refusal to close was not reasonable, a penalty shall be
3 assessed against the insurer or self-insured employer and paid to the worker
4 in an amount equal to 25 percent of all compensation determined to be then
5 due the claimant. **A self-insured employer may seek compensation from
6 the corporation if the corporation's incorrect notice or refusal to close
7 a claim resulted in liability to the self-insured employer under this
8 paragraph.**

9 “(g) If, upon reconsideration of a claim closed by an insurer or **by the**
10 **corporation on behalf of a** self-insured employer, the director orders an
11 increase by 25 percent or more of the amount of compensation to be paid to
12 the worker for permanent disability and the worker is found upon reconsid-
13 eration to be at least 20 percent permanently disabled, a penalty shall be
14 assessed against the insurer or self-insured employer and paid to the worker
15 in an amount equal to 25 percent of all compensation determined to be then
16 due the claimant. If the increase in compensation results from information
17 that the insurer or self-insured employer demonstrates the insurer or [*self-*
18 *insured employer*] **the corporation** could not reasonably have known at the
19 time of claim closure, from new information obtained through a medical ar-
20 biter examination or from a determination order issued by the director that
21 addresses the extent of the worker's permanent disability that is not based
22 on the standards adopted pursuant to ORS 656.726 (4)(f), the penalty shall
23 not be assessed. **A self-insured employer may seek compensation from
24 the corporation if the corporation's closure of the claim resulted in
25 liability to the self-insured employer after reconsideration under this
26 paragraph.**

27 “(6)(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, only one reconsider-
28 ation proceeding may be held on each notice of closure. At the reconsider-
29 ation proceeding:

30 “(A) A deposition arranged by the worker, limited to the testimony and

1 cross-examination of the worker about the worker's condition at the time of
2 claim closure, shall become part of the reconsideration record. The deposi-
3 tion must be conducted subject to the opportunity for cross-examination by
4 the insurer or self-insured employer and in accordance with rules adopted
5 by the director. The cost of the court reporter, interpreter services, if nec-
6 essary, and one original of the transcript of the deposition for the Depart-
7 ment of Consumer and Business Services and one copy of the transcript of
8 the deposition for each party shall be paid by the insurer or self-insured
9 employer. The reconsideration proceeding may not be postponed to receive
10 a deposition taken under this subparagraph. A deposition taken in accord-
11 ance with this subparagraph may be received as evidence at a hearing even
12 if the deposition is not prepared in time for use in the reconsideration pro-
13 ceeding.

14 “(B) Pursuant to rules adopted by the director, the worker or the insurer
15 or self-insured employer may correct information in the record that is erro-
16 neous and may submit any medical evidence that should have been but was
17 not submitted by the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to
18 provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 at the time of claim
19 closure.

20 “(C) If the director determines that a claim was not closed in accordance
21 with subsection (1) of this section, the director may rescind the closure.

22 “(b) If necessary, the director may require additional medical or other
23 information with respect to the claims and may postpone the reconsideration
24 for not more than 60 additional calendar days.

25 “(c) In any reconsideration proceeding under this section in which the
26 worker was represented by an attorney, the director shall order the insurer
27 or self-insured employer to pay to the attorney, out of the additional com-
28 pensation awarded, an amount equal to 10 percent of any additional com-
29 pensation awarded to the worker.

30 “(d) Except as provided in subsection (7) of this section, the reconsider-

1 ation proceeding shall be completed within 18 working days from the date
2 the reconsideration proceeding begins, and shall be performed by a special
3 evaluation appellate unit within the department. The deadline of 18 working
4 days may be postponed by an additional 60 calendar days if within the 18
5 working days the department mails notice of review by a medical arbiter. If
6 an order on reconsideration has not been mailed on or before 18 working
7 days from the date the reconsideration proceeding begins, or within 18
8 working days plus the additional 60 calendar days where a notice for medical
9 arbiter review was timely mailed or the director postponed the reconsideration
10 pursuant to paragraph (b) of this subsection, or within such additional
11 time as provided in subsection (8) of this section when reconsideration is
12 postponed further because the worker has failed to cooperate in the medical
13 arbiter examination, reconsideration shall be deemed denied and any further
14 proceedings shall occur as though an order on reconsideration affirming the
15 notice of closure was mailed on the date the order was due to issue.

16 “(e) The period for completing the reconsideration proceeding described
17 in paragraph (d) of this subsection begins upon receipt by the director of a
18 worker’s or a beneficiary’s request for reconsideration pursuant to subsection
19 (5)(e) of this section. If the insurer or self-insured employer requests recon-
20 sideration, the period for reconsideration begins upon the earlier of the date
21 of the request for reconsideration by the worker or beneficiary, the date of
22 receipt of a waiver from the worker or beneficiary of the right to request
23 reconsideration or the date of expiration of the right of the worker or ben-
24 eficiary to request reconsideration. If a party elects not to file a separate
25 request for reconsideration, the party does not waive the right to fully par-
26 ticipate in the reconsideration proceeding, including the right to proceed
27 with the reconsideration if the initiating party withdraws the request for
28 reconsideration.

29 “(f) Any medical arbiter report may be received as evidence at a hearing
30 even if the report is not prepared in time for use in the reconsideration

1 proceeding.

2 “(g) If any party objects to the reconsideration order, the party may re-
3 quest a hearing under ORS 656.283 within 30 days from the date of the re-
4 consideration order.

5 “(7)(a) The director may delay the reconsideration proceeding and toll the
6 reconsideration timeline established under subsection (6) of this section for
7 up to 45 calendar days if:

8 “(A) A request for reconsideration of a notice of closure has been made
9 to the director within 60 days of the date of the notice of closure;

10 “(B) The parties are actively engaged in settlement negotiations that in-
11 clude issues in dispute at reconsideration;

12 “(C) The parties agree to the delay; and

13 “(D) Both parties notify the director before the 18th working day after the
14 reconsideration proceeding has begun that they request a delay under this
15 subsection.

16 “(b) A delay of the reconsideration proceeding granted by the director
17 under this subsection expires:

18 “(A) If a party requests the director to resume the reconsideration pro-
19 ceeding before the expiration of the delay period;

20 “(B) If the parties reach a settlement and the director receives a copy of
21 the approved settlement documents before the expiration of the delay period;

22 or

23 “(C) On the next calendar day following the expiration of the delay period
24 authorized by the director.

25 “(c) Upon expiration of a delay granted under this subsection, the
26 timeline for the completion of the reconsideration proceeding shall resume
27 as if the delay had never been granted.

28 “(d) Compensation due the worker shall continue to be paid during the
29 period of delay authorized under this subsection.

30 “(e) The director may authorize only one delay period for each reconsid-

1 eration proceeding.

2 “(8)(a) If the basis for objection to a notice of closure issued under this
3 section is disagreement with the impairment used in rating of the worker’s
4 disability, the director shall refer the claim to a medical arbiter appointed
5 by the director.

6 “(b) If the director determines that insufficient medical information is
7 available to determine disability, the director may appoint, and refer the
8 claim to, a medical arbiter.

9 “(c) At the request of either of the parties, the director shall appoint a
10 panel of as many as three medical arbiters in accordance with criteria that
11 the director sets by rule.

12 “(d) The arbiter, or panel of medical arbiters, must be chosen from among
13 a list of physicians qualified to be attending physicians referred to in ORS
14 656.005 (12)(b)(A) whom the director selected in consultation with the Oregon
15 Medical Board and the committee referred to in ORS 656.790.

16 “(e)(A) The medical arbiter or panel of medical arbiters may examine the
17 worker and perform such tests as may be reasonable and necessary to es-
18 tablish the worker’s impairment.

19 “(B) If the director determines that the worker failed to attend the ex-
20 amination without good cause or failed to cooperate with the medical arbi-
21 ter, or panel of medical arbiters, the director shall postpone the
22 reconsideration proceedings for up to 60 days from the date of the determi-
23 nation that the worker failed to attend or cooperate, and shall suspend all
24 disability benefits resulting from this or any prior opening of the claim until
25 such time as the worker attends and cooperates with the examination or the
26 request for reconsideration is withdrawn. Any additional evidence regarding
27 good cause must be submitted prior to the conclusion of the 60-day
28 postponement period.

29 “(C) At the conclusion of the 60-day postponement period, if the worker
30 has not attended and cooperated with a medical arbiter examination or es-

1 tablished good cause, the worker may not attend a medical arbiter examina-
2 tion for this claim closure. The reconsideration record must be closed, and
3 the director shall issue an order on reconsideration based upon the existing
4 record.

5 “(D) All disability benefits suspended under this subsection, including all
6 disability benefits awarded in the order on reconsideration, or by an Ad-
7 ministrative Law Judge, the Workers’ Compensation Board or upon court
8 review, are not due and payable to the worker.

9 “(f) The insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the costs of examina-
10 tion and review by the medical arbiter or panel of medical arbiters.

11 “(g) The findings of the medical arbiter or panel of medical arbiters must
12 be submitted to the director for reconsideration of the notice of closure.

13 “(h) After reconsideration, no subsequent medical evidence of the
14 worker’s impairment is admissible before the director, the Workers’ Com-
15 pensation Board or the courts for purposes of making findings of impairment
16 on the claim closure.

17 “(i)(A) If the basis for objection to a notice of closure issued under this
18 section is a disagreement with the impairment used in rating the worker’s
19 disability, and the director determines that the worker is not medically sta-
20 tionary at the time of the reconsideration or that the closure was not made
21 pursuant to this section, the director is not required to appoint a medical
22 arbiter before completing the reconsideration proceeding.

23 “(B) If the worker’s condition has substantially changed since the notice
24 of closure, upon the consent of all the parties to the claim, the director shall
25 postpone the proceeding until the worker’s condition is appropriate for claim
26 closure under subsection (1) of this section.

27 “(9) No hearing shall be held on any issue that was not raised and pre-
28 served before the director at reconsideration. However, issues arising out
29 of the reconsideration order may be addressed and resolved at hearing.

30 “(10) If, after the notice of closure issued pursuant to this section, the

1 worker becomes enrolled and actively engaged in training according to rules
2 adopted pursuant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726, any permanent disability pay-
3 ments due for work disability under the closure shall be suspended, and the
4 worker shall receive temporary disability compensation and any permanent
5 disability payments due for impairment while the worker is enrolled and
6 actively engaged in the training. When the worker ceases to be enrolled and
7 actively engaged in the training, the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf**
8 **of the** self-insured employer, shall again close the claim pursuant to this
9 section if the worker is medically stationary or if the worker's accepted in-
10 jury is no longer the major contributing cause of the worker's combined or
11 consequential condition or conditions pursuant to ORS 656.005 (7). The clo-
12 sure shall include the duration of temporary total or temporary partial dis-
13 ability compensation. Permanent disability compensation shall be
14 redetermined for work disability only. If the worker has returned to work
15 or the worker's attending physician has released the worker to return to
16 regular or modified employment, the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf**
17 **of the** self-insured employer, shall again close the claim. This notice of clo-
18 sure may be appealed only in the same manner as are other notices of closure
19 under this section.

20 “(11) If the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to pro-
21 vide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 has approved the
22 worker's return to work and there is a labor dispute in progress at the place
23 of employment, the worker may refuse to return to that employment without
24 loss of reemployment rights or any vocational assistance provided by this
25 chapter.

26 “(12) Any notice of closure made under this section may include necessary
27 adjustments in compensation paid or payable prior to the notice of closure,
28 including disallowance of permanent disability payments prematurely made,
29 crediting temporary disability payments against current or future permanent
30 or temporary disability awards or payments and requiring the payment of

1 temporary disability payments which were payable but not paid.

2 “(13) An insurer or self-insured employer may take a credit or offset of
3 previously paid workers’ compensation benefits or payments against any
4 further workers’ compensation benefits or payments due a worker from that
5 insurer or self-insured employer when the worker admits to having obtained
6 the previously paid benefits or payments through fraud, or a civil judgment
7 or criminal conviction is entered against the worker for having obtained the
8 previously paid benefits through fraud. Benefits or payments obtained
9 through fraud by a worker may not be included in any data used for
10 ratemaking or individual employer rating or dividend calculations by an
11 insurer, a rating organization licensed pursuant to ORS chapter 737, the
12 [*State Accident Insurance Fund*] corporation or the director.

13 “(14)(a) An insurer or self-insured employer may offset any compensation
14 payable to the worker to recover an overpayment from a claim with the same
15 insurer or self-insured employer. When overpayments are recovered from
16 temporary disability or permanent total disability benefits, the amount re-
17 covered from each payment shall not exceed 25 percent of the payment,
18 without prior authorization from the worker.

19 “(b) An insurer or self-insured employer may suspend and offset any
20 compensation payable to the beneficiary of the worker, and recover an
21 overpayment of permanent total disability benefits caused by the failure of
22 the worker’s beneficiaries to notify the insurer or self-insured employer
23 about the death of the worker.

24 “(15) Conditions that are direct medical sequelae to the original accepted
25 condition shall be included in rating permanent disability of the claim unless
26 they have been specifically denied.

27 **“SECTION 9.** ORS 656.273 is amended to read:

28 “656.273. (1) After the last award or arrangement of compensation, an in-
29 jured worker is entitled to additional compensation for worsened conditions
30 resulting from the original injury. A worsened condition resulting from the

1 original injury is established by medical evidence of an actual worsening of
2 the compensable condition supported by objective findings. However, if the
3 major contributing cause of the worsened condition is an injury not occur-
4 ring within the course and scope of employment, the worsening is not
5 compensable. A worsened condition is not established by either or both of
6 the following:

7 “(a) The worker’s absence from work for any given amount of time as a
8 result of the worker’s condition from the original injury; or

9 “(b) Inpatient treatment of the worker at a hospital for the worker’s
10 condition from the original injury.

11 “(2) To obtain additional medical services or disability compensation, the
12 injured worker must file a claim for aggravation with the insurer or self-
13 insured employer. In the event the insurer or self-insured employer cannot
14 be located, is unknown, or has ceased to exist, the claim shall be filed with
15 the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

16 “(3) A claim for aggravation must be in writing in a form and format
17 prescribed by the director and signed by the worker or the worker’s repre-
18 sentative and the worker’s attending physician. When an insurer or self-
19 insured employer receives a completed aggravation form, the insurer [*or*
20 *self-insured employer*] shall process the claim **and the self-insured em-
21 ployer shall immediately forward the claim to the State Accident In-
22 surance Fund Corporation for processing.**

23 “(4) The claim for aggravation must be filed within five years:

24 “(a) After the first notice of closure made under ORS 656.268 for a disa-
25 bling claim; or

26 “(b) After the date of injury, provided the claim has been classified as
27 nondisabling for at least one year after the date of acceptance.

28 “(5) The director may order the claimant, the insurer or self-insured em-
29 ployer to pay for such medical opinion.

30 “(6) A claim submitted in accordance with this section shall be processed

1 by the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer,
2 in accordance with the provisions of ORS 656.262. The first installment of
3 compensation due under ORS 656.262 shall be paid no later than the 14th day
4 after the subject employer or paying agent of the subject employer receives
5 a written report that verifies the worker's inability to work resulting from
6 a compensable worsening under subsection (1) of this section and that es-
7 tablishes by medical evidence supported by objective findings that the
8 claimant has suffered a worsened condition attributable to the compensable
9 injury.

10 “(7) A request for hearing on any issue involving a claim for aggravation
11 must be made to the Workers' Compensation Board in accordance with ORS
12 656.283.

13 “(8) If the worker submits a claim for aggravation of an injury or disease
14 for which permanent disability has been previously awarded, the worker
15 must establish that the worsening is more than waxing and waning of
16 symptoms of the condition contemplated by the previous permanent disability
17 award.

18 **“SECTION 10.** ORS 656.277 is amended to read:

19 “656.277. (1)(a) A request for reclassification by the worker of an accepted
20 nondisabling injury that the worker believes was or has become disabling
21 must be submitted to the insurer or self-insured employer. The insurer or **the**
22 **State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf of the** self-
23 insured employer, shall classify the claim as disabling or nondisabling within
24 14 days of the request. A notice of such classification shall be mailed to the
25 worker and the worker's attorney if the worker is represented. The worker
26 may ask the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services
27 to review the classification by the insurer or [*self-insured employer*] **the**
28 **corporation** by submitting a request for review within 60 days of the mail-
29 ing of the classification notice by the insurer or **the corporation on behalf**
30 **of the** self-insured employer. If any party objects to the classification of the

1 director, the party may request a hearing under ORS 656.283 within 30 days
2 from the date of the director's order.

3 “(b) If the worker is represented by an attorney and the attorney is in-
4 strumental in obtaining an order from the director that reclassifies the claim
5 from nondisabling to disabling, the director may award the attorney a rea-
6 sonable assessed attorney fee.

7 “(2) A request by the worker that an accepted nondisabling injury was
8 or has become disabling shall be made pursuant to ORS 656.273 as a claim
9 for aggravation, provided the claim has been classified as nondisabling for
10 at least one year after the date of acceptance.

11 “(3) A claim for a nondisabling injury shall not be reported to the director
12 by the insurer or self-insured employer except:

13 “(a) When a notice of claim denial is filed;

14 “(b) When the status of the claim is as described in subsection (1) or (2)
15 of this section; or

16 “(c) When otherwise required by the director.

17 **“SECTION 11.** ORS 656.278 is amended to read:

18 “656.278. (1) Except as provided in subsection (7) of this section, the power
19 and jurisdiction of the Workers' Compensation Board shall be continuing,
20 and it may, upon its own motion, from time to time modify, change or ter-
21 minate former findings, orders or awards if in its opinion such action is
22 justified in those cases in which:

23 “(a) There is a worsening of a compensable injury that results in the in-
24 ability of the worker to work and requires hospitalization or inpatient or
25 outpatient surgery, or other curative treatment prescribed in lieu of
26 hospitalization that is necessary to enable the injured worker to return to
27 work. In such cases, the payment of temporary disability compensation in
28 accordance with ORS 656.210, 656.212 (2) and 656.262 (4) may be provided
29 from the time the attending physician authorizes temporary disability com-
30 pensation for the hospitalization, surgery or other curative treatment until

1 the worker's condition becomes medically stationary;

2 “(b) The worker submits and obtains acceptance of a claim for a
3 compensable new medical condition or an omitted medical condition pursu-
4 ant to ORS 656.267 and the claim is initiated after the rights under ORS
5 656.273 have expired. In such cases, the payment of temporary disability
6 compensation in accordance with the provisions of ORS 656.210, 656.212 (2)
7 and 656.262 (4) may be provided from the time the attending physician au-
8 thorizes temporary disability compensation for the hospitalization, surgery
9 or other curative treatment until the worker's condition becomes medically
10 stationary, and the payment of permanent disability benefits may be provided
11 after application of the standards for the evaluation and determination of
12 disability as may be adopted by the Director of the Department of Consumer
13 and Business Services pursuant to ORS 656.726; or

14 “(c) The date of injury is earlier than January 1, 1966. In such cases, in
15 addition to the payment of temporary disability compensation, the payment
16 of medical benefits may be provided.

17 “(2) Benefits provided under subsection (1) of this section:

18 “(a) Do not include vocational assistance benefits under ORS 656.340;

19 “(b) Do not include temporary disability compensation for periods of time
20 during which the claimant did not qualify as a ‘worker’ pursuant to ORS
21 656.005 (30);

22 “(c) Do not include medical services provided pursuant to ORS 656.245
23 except as provided under subsection (1)(c) of this section; and

24 “(d) May include permanent disability benefits for additional impairment
25 to an injured body part that has previously been the basis of a permanent
26 partial disability award, but only to the extent that the permanent partial
27 disability rating exceeds the permanent partial disability rated by the prior
28 award or awards.

29 “(3) An order or award made by the board during the time within which
30 the claimant has the right to request a hearing on aggravation under ORS

1 656.273 is not an order or award, as the case may be, made by the board on
2 its own motion.

3 “(4) Pursuant to ORS 656.298, any party may appeal an order or award
4 made by the board on its own motion.

5 “(5) The insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured em-
6 ployer, may voluntarily reopen any claim to provide benefits allowable under
7 this section or to grant additional medical or hospital care to the claimant.
8 The board shall establish procedures for the resolution of disputes arising
9 out of a voluntary reopening of a claim under this section.

10 “(6) Any claim reopened under this section shall be closed by the insurer
11 or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, in a manner
12 prescribed by the board, including, when appropriate, an award of permanent
13 disability benefits as determined under subsections (1)(b) and (2)(d) of this
14 section. The board shall also prescribe a process to be followed if the worker
15 objects to the claim closure.

16 “(7) The provisions of this section do not authorize the board, on its own
17 motion, to modify, change or terminate former findings or orders:

18 “(a) That a claimant incurred no injury or incurred a noncompensable
19 injury; or

20 “(b) Approving disposition of a claim under ORS 656.236 or 656.289 (4).

21 **“SECTION 12.** ORS 656.283 is amended to read:

22 “656.283. (1) Subject to ORS 656.319, any party or the Director of the De-
23 partment of Consumer and Business Services may at any time request a
24 hearing on any matter concerning a claim, except matters for which a pro-
25 cedure for resolving the dispute is provided in another statute, including
26 ORS 656.704.

27 “(2) A request for hearing may be made by any writing, signed by or on
28 behalf of the party and including the address of the party, requesting the
29 hearing, stating that a hearing is desired, and mailed to the Workers’ Com-
30 pensation Board.

1 “(3)(a) The board shall refer the request for hearing to an Administrative
2 Law Judge for determination as expeditiously as possible. The hearing shall
3 be scheduled for a date not more than 90 days after receipt by the board of
4 the request for hearing. The hearing may not be postponed:

5 “(A) Except in extraordinary circumstances beyond the control of the re-
6 questing party; and

7 “(B) For more than 120 days after the date of the postponed hearing.

8 “(b) When a hearing set pursuant to paragraph (a) of this subsection is
9 postponed because of the need to join one or more potentially responsible
10 employers or insurers, the assigned Administrative Law Judge shall re-
11 schedule the hearing as expeditiously as possible after all potentially re-
12 sponsible employers and insurers have been joined in the proceeding and the
13 medical record has been fully developed. The board shall adopt rules for
14 hearings on claims involving one or more potentially responsible employers
15 and insurers that:

16 “(A) Require the parties to participate in any prehearing conferences re-
17 quired to expedite the hearing; and

18 “(B) Authorize the Administrative Law Judge conducting the hearing to:

19 “(i) Establish a prehearing schedule for investigation of the claim, in-
20 cluding but not limited to the interviewing of the claimant;

21 “(ii) Make prehearing rulings necessary to promote full discovery and
22 completion of the medical record required for determination of the issues
23 arising from the claim; and

24 “(iii) Specify what is required of the claimant to meet the obligation to
25 reasonably cooperate with the investigation of claims.

26 “(c) Nothing in paragraph (b) of this subsection alters the obligation of
27 an insurer or **the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf**
28 **of a** self-insured employer, to accept or deny a claim for compensation as
29 required under this chapter.

30 “(d) If a hearing has been postponed in accordance with paragraph (b) of

1 this subsection:

2 “(A) The director may not consider the timeliness of a denial issued in
3 the claim that is the subject of the hearing for the purpose of imposing a
4 penalty against an insurer or self-insured employer that is potentially re-
5 sponsible for the claim; and

6 “(B) The 120-day maximum postponement established under paragraph (a)
7 of this subsection for rescheduling a hearing does not apply.

8 “(4)(a) At least 60 days’ prior notice of the time and place of hearing shall
9 be given to all parties in interest by mail. Hearings shall be held in the
10 county where the worker resided at the time of the injury or such other
11 place selected by the Administrative Law Judge.

12 “(b) The 60-day prior notice required by paragraph (a) of this subsection:

13 “(A) May be waived by agreement of the parties and the board if waiver
14 of the notice will result in an earlier date for the hearing.

15 “(B) Does not apply to hearings in cases assigned to the Expedited Claim
16 Service under ORS 656.291, cases involving stayed compensation under ORS
17 656.313 (1)(b) and requests for hearing that are consolidated with an existing
18 case with an existing hearing date.

19 “(5) A record of all proceedings at the hearing shall be kept but need not
20 be transcribed unless a party requests a review of the order of the Adminis-
21 trative Law Judge. Transcription shall be in written form as provided by
22 ORS 656.295 (3).

23 “(6) Except as otherwise provided in this section and rules of procedure
24 established by the board, the Administrative Law Judge is not bound by
25 common law or statutory rules of evidence or by technical or formal rules
26 of procedure, and may conduct the hearing in any manner that will achieve
27 substantial justice. Neither the board nor an Administrative Law Judge may
28 prevent a party from withholding impeachment evidence until the opposing
29 party’s case in chief has been presented, at which time the impeachment ev-
30 idence may be used. Impeachment evidence consisting of medical or voca-

1 tional reports not used during the course of a hearing must be provided to
2 any opposing party at the conclusion of the presentation of evidence and
3 before closing arguments are presented. Impeachment evidence other than
4 medical or vocational reports that is not presented as evidence at hearing
5 is not subject to disclosure. Evaluation of the worker's disability by the

7 sideration order pursuant to ORS 656.268. Any finding of fact regarding the
8 worker's impairment must be established by medical evidence that is sup-
9 ported by objective findings. The Administrative Law Judge shall apply to
10 the hearing of the claim such standards for evaluation of disability as may
11 be adopted by the director pursuant to ORS 656.726. Evidence on an issue
12 regarding a notice of closure that was not submitted at the reconsideration
13 required by ORS 656.268 is not admissible at hearing, and issues that were
14 not raised by a party to the reconsideration may not be raised at hearing
15 unless the issue arises out of the reconsideration order itself. However,
16 nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent or limit the right of a
17 worker, insurer or self-insured employer to present the reconsideration re-
18 cord at hearing to establish by a preponderance of that evidence that the
19 standards adopted pursuant to ORS 656.726 for evaluation of the worker's
20 permanent disability were incorrectly applied in the reconsideration order
21 pursuant to ORS 656.268. If the Administrative Law Judge finds that the
22 claim has been closed prematurely, the Administrative Law Judge shall issue
23 an order rescinding the notice of closure.

24 “(7) Any party shall be entitled to issuance and service of subpoenas un-
25 der the provisions of ORS 656.726 (2)(c). Any party or representative of the
26 party may serve such subpoenas.

27 “(8) After a party requests a hearing and before the hearing commences,
28 the board, by rule, may require the requesting party, if represented by an
29 attorney, to notify the Administrative Law Judge in writing that the attor-
30 ney has conferred with the other party and that settlement has been

1 achieved, subject to board approval, or that settlement cannot be achieved.

2 **“SECTION 13.** ORS 656.313 is amended to read:

3 “656.313. (1)(a) Filing by an employer or the insurer of a request for
4 hearing on a reconsideration order before the Hearings Division, a request
5 for Workers’ Compensation Board review or court appeal or request for re-
6 view of an order of the Director of the Department of Consumer and Busi-
7 ness Services regarding vocational assistance stays payment of the
8 compensation appealed, except for:

9 “(A) Temporary disability benefits that accrue from the date of the order
10 appealed from until closure under ORS 656.268, or until the order appealed
11 from is itself reversed, whichever event first occurs;

12 “(B) Permanent total disability benefits that accrue from the date of the
13 order appealed from until the order appealed from is reversed;

14 “(C) Death benefits payable to a surviving spouse prior to remarriage, to
15 children or dependents that accrue from the date of the order appealed from
16 until the order appealed from is reversed; and

17 “(D) Vocational benefits ordered by the director pursuant to ORS 656.340
18 (16). If a denial of vocational benefits is upheld by a final order, the insurer
19 or self-insured employer shall be reimbursed from the Workers’ Benefit Fund
20 pursuant to ORS 656.605 for all costs incurred in providing vocational bene-
21 fits as a result of the order that was appealed.

22 “(b) If ultimately found payable under a final order, benefits withheld
23 under this subsection, and attorney fees and costs, shall accrue interest at
24 the rate provided in ORS 82.010 from the date of the order appealed from
25 through the date of payment. The board shall expedite review of appeals in
26 which payment of compensation has been stayed under this section.

27 “(2) If the board or court subsequently orders that compensation to the
28 claimant should not have been allowed or should have been awarded in a
29 lesser amount than awarded, the claimant shall not be obligated to repay any
30 such compensation which was paid pending the review or appeal.

1 “(3) If an insurer or **the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation,**
2 **on behalf of a** self-insured employer, denies the compensability of all or any
3 portion of a claim submitted for medical services, the insurer or [*self-insured*
4 *employer*] **the corporation** shall send notice of the denial to each provider
5 of such medical services and to any provider of health insurance for the in-
6 jured worker. Except for medical services payable in accordance with ORS
7 656.247, after receiving notice of the denial, a medical service provider may
8 submit medical reports and bills for the disputed medical services to the
9 provider of health insurance for the injured worker. The health insurance
10 provider shall pay all such bills in accordance with the limits, terms and
11 conditions of the policy. If the injured worker has no health insurance, such
12 bills may be submitted to the injured worker. A provider of disputed medical
13 services shall make no further effort to collect disputed medical service bills
14 from the injured worker until the issue of compensability of the medical
15 services has been finally determined.

16 “(4) Except for medical services payable in accordance with ORS 656.247:

17 “(a) When the compensability issue has been finally determined or when
18 disposition or settlement of the claim has been made pursuant to ORS 656.236
19 or 656.289 (4), the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured
20 employer, shall notify each affected service provider and health insurance
21 provider of the results of the disposition or settlement.

22 “(b) If the services are determined to be compensable, the insurer or
23 self-insured employer shall reimburse each health insurance provider for the
24 amount of claims paid by the health insurance provider pursuant to this
25 section. Such reimbursement shall be in addition to compensation or medical
26 benefits the worker receives. Medical service reimbursement shall be paid
27 directly to the health insurance provider.

28 “(c) If the services are settled pursuant to ORS 656.289 (4), the insurer
29 or self-insured employer shall reimburse, out of the settlement proceeds, each
30 medical service provider for billings received by the insurer or self-insured

1 employer on and before the date on which the terms of settlement are agreed
2 as specified in the settlement document that are not otherwise partially or
3 fully reimbursed.

4 “(d) Reimbursement under this section shall be made only for medical
5 services related to the claim that would be compensable under this chapter
6 if the claim were compensable and shall be made at one-half the amount
7 provided under ORS 656.248. In no event shall reimbursement made to med-
8 ical service providers exceed 40 percent of the total present value of the
9 settlement amount, except with the consent of the worker. If the settlement
10 proceeds are insufficient to allow each medical service provider the re-
11 imbursement amount authorized under this subsection, the insurer or self-
12 insured employer shall reduce each provider’s reimbursement by the same
13 proportional amount. Reimbursement under this section shall not prevent a
14 medical service provider or health insurance provider from recovering the
15 balance of amounts owing for such services directly from the worker, unless
16 the worker agrees to pay all medical service providers directly from the
17 settlement proceeds the amount provided under ORS 656.248.

18 “(5) As used in this section, ‘health insurance’ has the meaning for that
19 term provided in ORS 731.162.

20 “**SECTION 14.** ORS 656.325 is amended to read:

21 “656.325. (1)(a) Any worker entitled to receive compensation under this
22 chapter is required, if requested by the Director of the Department of Con-
23 sumer and Business Services, the insurer or **the State Accident Insurance**
24 **Fund Corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer, to submit to a
25 medical examination at a time reasonably convenient for the worker as may
26 be provided by the rules of the director. No more than three independent
27 medical examinations may be requested except after notification to and au-
28 thorization by the director. If the worker refuses to submit to any such ex-
29 amination, or obstructs the same, the rights of the worker to compensation
30 shall be suspended with the consent of the director until the examination

1 has taken place, and no compensation shall be payable during or for account
2 of such period. The provisions of this paragraph are subject to the limita-
3 tions on medical examinations provided in ORS 656.268.

4 “(b) When a worker is requested by the director, the insurer or **the cor-**
5 **poration, on behalf of the** self-insured employer, to attend an independent
6 medical examination, the examination must be conducted by a physician se-
7 lected from a list of qualified physicians established by the director under
8 ORS 656.328.

9 “(c) The director shall adopt rules applicable to independent medical ex-
10 aminations conducted pursuant to paragraph (a) of this subsection that:

11 “(A) Provide a worker the opportunity to request review by the director
12 of the reasonableness of the location selected for an independent medical
13 examination. Upon receipt of the request for review, the director shall con-
14 duct an expedited review of the location selected for the independent medical
15 examination and issue an order on the reasonableness of the location of the
16 examination. The director shall determine if there is substantial evidence for
17 the objection to the location for the independent medical examination based
18 on a conclusion that the required travel is medically contraindicated or
19 other good cause establishing that the required travel is unreasonable. The
20 determinations of the director about the location of independent medical
21 examinations are not subject to review.

22 “(B) Impose a monetary penalty against a worker who fails to attend an
23 independent medical examination without prior notification or without jus-
24 tification for not attending the examination. A penalty imposed under this
25 subparagraph may be imposed only on a worker who is not receiving tem-
26 porary disability benefits under ORS 656.210 or 656.212. An insurer or self-
27 insured employer may offset any future compensation payable to the worker
28 to recover any penalty imposed under this subparagraph from a claim with
29 the same insurer or self-insured employer. When a penalty is recovered from
30 temporary disability or permanent total disability benefits, the amount re-

1 covered from each payment may not exceed 25 percent of the benefit payment
2 without prior authorization from the worker.

3 “(C) Impose a sanction against a medical service provider that unreason-
4 ably fails to provide in a timely manner diagnostic records required for an
5 independent medical examination.

6 “(d) Notwithstanding ORS 656.262 (6), if the director determines that the
7 location selected for an independent medical examination is unreasonable,
8 the insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of the** self-insured employer,
9 shall accept or deny the claim within 90 days after the employer has notice
10 or knowledge of the claim.

11 “(e) If the worker has made a timely request for a hearing on a denial
12 of compensability as required by ORS 656.319 (1)(a) that is based on one or
13 more reports of examinations conducted pursuant to paragraph (a) of this
14 subsection and the worker’s attending physician or nurse practitioner au-
15 thorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 does not
16 concur with the report or reports, the worker may request an examination
17 to be conducted by a physician selected by the director from the list de-
18 scribed in ORS 656.328. The cost of the examination and the examination
19 report shall be paid by the insurer or self-insured employer.

20 “(f) The insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the costs of the medical
21 examination and related services which are reasonably necessary to allow
22 the worker to submit to any examination requested under this section. As
23 used in this paragraph, ‘related services’ includes, but is not limited to, child
24 care, travel, meals, lodging and an amount equivalent to the worker’s net
25 lost wages for the period during which the worker is absent if the worker
26 does not receive benefits pursuant to ORS 656.210 (4) during the period of
27 absence. A claim for ‘related services’ described in this paragraph shall be
28 made in the manner prescribed by the director.

29 “(g) A worker who objects to the location of an independent medical ex-
30 amination must request review by the director under paragraph (c)(A) of this

1 subsection within six business days of the date the notice of the independent
2 medical examination was mailed.

3 “(2) For any period of time during which any worker commits insanitary
4 or injurious practices which tend to either imperil or retard recovery of the
5 worker, or refuses to submit to such medical or surgical treatment as is
6 reasonably essential to promote recovery, or fails to participate in a program
7 of physical rehabilitation, the right of the worker to compensation shall be
8 suspended with the consent of the director and no payment shall be made for
9 such period. The period during which such worker would otherwise be enti-
10 tled to compensation may be reduced with the consent of the director to such
11 an extent as the disability has been increased by such refusal.

12 “(3) A worker who has received an award for permanent total or perma-
13 nent partial disability should be encouraged to make a reasonable effort to
14 reduce the disability; and the award shall be subject to periodic examination
15 and adjustment in conformity with ORS 656.268.

16 “(4) When the employer of an injured worker, or the employer’s insurer
17 determines that the injured worker has failed to follow medical advice from
18 the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide
19 compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 or has failed to participate
20 in or complete physical restoration or vocational rehabilitation programs
21 prescribed for the worker pursuant to this chapter, the employer or insurer
22 may petition the director for reduction of any benefits awarded the worker.
23 Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, if the director finds
24 that the worker has failed to accept treatment as provided in this subsection,
25 the director may reduce any benefits awarded the worker by such amount
26 as the director considers appropriate.

27 “(5)(a) Except as provided by ORS 656.268 (4)(c) and (11), an insurer or
28 self-insured employer shall cease making payments pursuant to ORS 656.210
29 and shall commence making payment of such amounts as are due pursuant
30 to ORS 656.212 when an injured worker refuses wage earning employment

1 prior to claim determination and the worker’s attending physician or nurse
2 practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS
3 656.245, after being notified by the employer of the specific duties to be per-
4 formed by the injured worker, agrees that the injured worker is capable of
5 performing the employment offered.

6 “(b) If the worker has been terminated for violation of work rules or other
7 disciplinary reasons, the insurer or self-insured employer shall cease pay-
8 ments pursuant to ORS 656.210 and commence payments pursuant to ORS
9 656.212 when the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to
10 provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 approves employ-
11 ment in a modified job that would have been offered to the worker if the
12 worker had remained employed, provided that the employer has a written
13 policy of offering modified work to injured workers.

14 “(c) If the worker is a person present in the United States in violation
15 of federal immigration laws, the insurer or self-insured employer shall cease
16 payments pursuant to ORS 656.210 and commence payments pursuant to ORS
17 656.212 when the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to
18 provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 approves employ-
19 ment in a modified job whether or not such a job is available.

20 “(6) Any party may request a hearing on any dispute under this section
21 pursuant to ORS 656.283.

22 “**SECTION 15.** ORS 656.327 is amended to read:

23 “656.327. (1)(a) If an injured worker, an insurer or self-insured employer
24 or the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services be-
25 lieves that the medical treatment, not subject to ORS 656.260, that the in-
26 jured worker has received, is receiving, will receive or is proposed to receive
27 is excessive, inappropriate, ineffectual or in violation of rules regarding the
28 performance of medical services, the injured worker, insurer or self-insured
29 employer must request administrative review of the treatment by the director
30 prior to requesting a hearing on the issue and so notify the parties.

1 “(b) Unless the director issues an order finding that no bona fide medical
2 services dispute exists, the director shall review the matter as provided in
3 this section. Appeal of an order finding that no bona fide medical services
4 dispute exists shall be made directly to the Workers’ Compensation Board
5 within 30 days after issuance of the order. The board shall set aside or re-
6 mand the order only if the board finds that the order is not supported by
7 substantial evidence in the record. Substantial evidence exists to support a
8 finding in the order when the record, reviewed as a whole, would permit a
9 reasonable person to make that finding. The decision of the board is not
10 subject to review by any other court or administrative agency.

11 “(c) The insurer or **the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation,**
12 **on behalf of a** self-insured employer, shall not deny the claim for medical
13 services nor shall the worker request a hearing on any issue under this
14 section until the director issues an order under subsection (2) of this section.

15 “(2) The director shall review medical information and records regarding
16 the treatment. The director may cause an appropriate medical service pro-
17 vider to perform reasonable and appropriate tests, other than invasive tests,
18 upon the worker and may examine the worker. Notwithstanding ORS 656.325
19 (1), the worker may refuse a test without sanction. Review of the medical
20 treatment shall be completed and the director shall issue an order within 60
21 days of the request for review. The director shall create a documentary re-
22 cord sufficient for purposes of judicial review. If the worker, insurer, self-
23 insured employer or medical service provider is dissatisfied with that order,
24 the dissatisfied party may request review under ORS 656.704. The adminis-
25 trative order may be modified at hearing only if it is not supported by sub-
26 stantial evidence in the record or if it reflects an error of law. No new
27 medical evidence or issues shall be admitted. The worker is not obligated to
28 pay for medical treatment determined not to be compensable under this sub-
29 section.

30 “(3) Upon request of either party, the director may delegate to a physician

1 or a panel of physicians the review of medical treatment under this section.
2 At least one member of any such panel shall be a practitioner of the healing
3 art of the medical service provider whose treatment is being reviewed. No
4 member of any such panel shall be a physician whose treatment is the sub-
5 ject of review. The panel shall be chosen in such manner as the director may
6 prescribe, in consultation with the committee referred to in ORS 656.790. The
7 physician or panel shall submit findings to the director within the time
8 limits as prescribed by the director.

9 “(4) The physician or the panel of physicians and the medical arbiter or
10 panel of medical arbiters appointed pursuant to ORS 656.268 acting pursuant
11 to the authority of the director are agents of the Department of Consumer
12 and Business Services and are subject to the provisions of ORS 30.260 to
13 30.300. The findings of the physician or panel of physicians, the medical ar-
14 biter or panel of medical arbiters, all of the records and all communications
15 to or before a panel or arbiter are privileged and are not discoverable or
16 admissible in any proceeding other than those proceedings under this chap-
17 ter. No member of a panel or a medical arbiter shall be examined or subject
18 to administrative or civil liability regarding participation in or the findings
19 of the panel or medical arbiter or any matter before the panel or medical
20 arbiter other than in proceedings under this chapter.

21 “(5) The costs of review of medical treatment by the physician or panel
22 of physicians pursuant to this section and costs incurred by the worker in
23 attending any examination required under this section, including child care,
24 transportation, lodging and meals, shall be paid by the insurer or self-insured
25 employer.

26 **“SECTION 16.** ORS 656.331 is amended to read:

27 “656.331. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, if an
28 injured worker is represented by an attorney and the attorney has given
29 written notice of such representation:

30 “(a) The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services,

1 the insurer or **the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation, on be-**
2 **half of a** self-insured employer, shall not request the worker to submit to
3 an independent medical examination without giving prior or simultaneous
4 written notice to the worker’s attorney.

5 “(b) An insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured
6 employer, shall not contact the worker without giving prior or simultaneous
7 written notice to the worker’s attorney if the contact affects the denial, re-
8 duction or termination of the worker’s benefits.

9 “(2) The director shall adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions
10 of subsection (1)(b) of this section.

11 **“SECTION 17.** ORS 656.403 is amended to read:

12 “656.403. (1) A self-insured employer directly assumes the responsibility
13 for providing compensation due subject workers and their beneficiaries under
14 this chapter.

15 “(2) The claims of subject workers and their beneficiaries resulting from
16 injuries while employed by a self-insured employer shall be handled in the
17 manner [*provided by this chapter*] **specified in ORS 656.262 (1)(b)**. A self-
18 insured employer is subject to the rules of the Director of the Department
19 of Consumer and Business Services with respect to such claims.

20 “(3) Security deposited by a self-insured employer shall not relieve any
21 such employer from full and primary responsibility for [*claims administration*
22 *and*] payment of compensation under this chapter. This subsection applies to
23 a self-insured employer even though the self-insured employer insures or
24 reinsures all or any portion of risks under this chapter with an insurance
25 company authorized to do business in this state or with any other insurer
26 with whom insurance can be placed or secured pursuant to ORS 744.305 to

28 “(4) When a self-insured employer is a worker leasing company required
29 to be licensed pursuant to ORS 656.850 and 656.855, the company also shall
30 comply with the worker leasing company regulatory provisions of ORS

1 chapters 656 and 737 and with such rules as may be adopted pursuant to ORS
2 656.726 and 731.244 for the supervision and regulation of worker leasing
3 companies.

4 **“SECTION 18.** ORS 656.407 is amended to read:

5 “656.407. (1) An employer shall establish proof with the Director of the
6 Department of Consumer and Business Services that the employer is quali-
7 fied either:

8 “(a) As a carrier-insured employer by causing proof of coverage provided
9 by an insurer to be filed with the director; or

10 “(b) As a self-insured employer by establishing proof that the employer
11 has [*an adequate staff qualified to process claims promptly and has*] the fi-
12 nancial ability to make certain the prompt payment of all compensation and
13 other payments that may become due to the director under this chapter.

14 “(2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, a self-insured
15 employer shall establish proof of financial ability by:

16 “(a) Demonstrating acceptable financial viability based on information
17 required by the director by rule; and

18 “(b) Providing security that the director determines acceptable by rule.
19 The security must be in an amount reasonably sufficient to insure payment
20 of compensation and other payments that may become due to the director
21 but not less than the employer’s normal expected annual claim liabilities and
22 in no event less than \$100,000. In arriving at the amount of security required
23 under this subsection, the director may take into consideration the financial
24 ability of the employer to pay compensation and other payments and proba-
25 ble continuity of operation. The security shall be held by the director to se-
26 cure the payment of compensation for injuries to subject workers of the

29 this subsection shall be deposited with the State Treasurer in an account
30 separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the account

3 “(3)(a) A city, county or a qualified self-insured employer group that
4 wishes to be exempt from subsection (2) of this section may make written
5 application therefor to the director. The application shall include a copy of
6 the most recent annual audit of the city, county or qualified self-insured
7 employer group filed with the Secretary of State under ORS 297.405 to
8 297.740, information regarding the establishment of a loss reserve account for

23 there is probable cause to believe that the loss reserve account is not

26 reserve account. The requirements of this subsection are in addition to and
27 not in lieu of any other audit or reporting requirement otherwise prescribed
28 by or pursuant to law.

29 “(ii) That is dedicated to and may be expended only for the payment of
30 compensation and amounts due the director by the city, county or qualified

1 self-insured employer group under this chapter.

2 “(b) The director shall have the first lien and priority right to the full
3 amount of the loss reserve account required to pay the present discounted
4 value of all present and future claims under this chapter.

5 “(c) The city, county or qualified self-insured employer group shall notify
6 the director no later than 60 days prior to any action to discontinue the loss
7 reserve account. The city, county or qualified self-insured employer group
8 shall advise the director of the plans of the city, county or qualified self-
9 insured employer group to submit the security deposits required in sub-
10 section (2) of this section, or obtain coverage as a carrier-insured employer
11 prior to the date the loss reserve account ceases to exist. If the city, county
12 or qualified self-insured employer group elects to discontinue self-insurance,

21 of the loss reserve account the director has not received the security deposits
22 required in subsection (2) of this section, the certificate of self-insurance of

26 a self-insured employer group that is a municipal corporation or a public

29 “656.455. (1)(a) Every self-insured employer shall maintain a place of
30 business in this state where the employer shall keep complete records of all

1 claims for compensation made to the employer under this chapter or a self-
2 insured employer may, under the conditions prescribed by ORS 731.475 (3),
3 keep such records in this state at places operated by service companies. The
4 records shall be retained in, and may be removed from, this state or disposed
5 of, in accordance with the rules of the Director of the Department of Con-
6 sumer and Business Services adopted pursuant to ORS 731.475. Such records
7 shall be available to the director for examination and audit at all reasonable
8 times upon notice by the director to the employer.

9 **“(b) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation shall keep**

17 all claims records and process claims from a location outside of the state.

29 “656.752. (1) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation is created
30 for the purpose of transacting workers’ compensation insurance and rein-

1 surance business. The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation also may
2 insure an Oregon employer against any liability such employer may have on
3 account of bodily injury to a worker of the employer arising out of and in
4 the course of employment as fully as any private insurance carrier.

5 “(2) The functions of the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation shall
6 be:

7 “(a) To confer with and solicit employers and to determine, handle, audit
8 and enforce collection of premiums, assessments and fees of insured employ-
9 ers insured with the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation;

10 “(b) To make insurance available to as many Oregon employers as
11 inexpensively as may be consistent with the overall integrity of the Indus-
12 trial Accident Fund, in accordance with ORS 656.634 and sound principles
13 of insurance;

14 “(c) To receive and handle and process the claims of workers and benefi-
15 ciaries of workers injured in the employ of insured employers insured with
16 the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation **and with all self-insured**
17 **employers, as provided in ORS 656.262 (1)(b);** and

18 “(d) To perform all other functions which the laws of this state specif-
19 ically authorize or which are necessary or appropriate to carry out the
20 functions expressly authorized.

21 “(3) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation in its name may sue
22 and be sued.

23 “(4) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation may authorize self-
24 insured employers or other insurers to use any physical rehabilitation center
25 operated by the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation on such terms
26 as the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation deems reasonable.

27 “(5) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation in its own name, may
28 acquire, lease, rent, own and manage real property. It may construct, equip
29 and furnish buildings or other structures as are necessary to accommodate
30 its needs. It may purchase, rent, lease or otherwise acquire for its use all

1 supplies, materials, equipment and services necessary to carry out its func-
2 tions. It may sell or otherwise dispose of any property acquired under this
3 subsection.

4 “(6) Any real property acquired and owned by the State Accident Insur-
5 ance Fund Corporation under this section shall be subject to ad valorem
6 taxation.

9 to any employer qualified as a self-insured employer under the provisions of

12 “(8) With the approval of the Director of the Department of Consumer and

14 vide reinsurance coverage to Oregon employers on such terms and conditions

16 “(9) The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation may contract with

21 “656.780. (1) The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business
22 Services shall:

23 “(a) Adopt by rule standards for certification of workers’ compensation
24 claims examiners that shall be administered by workers’ compensation
25 insurers, **the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation on behalf of**
26 self-insured employers and service companies; and

27 “(b) Develop or approve any training curriculum used by insurers, **the**
28 **corporation on behalf of** self-insured employers and service companies that
29 is related to interactions with independent medical examination providers
30 required under ORS 656.325.

1 “(2)(a) Each insurer[, *self-insured employer*] and service company shall

19 “656.802. (1)(a) As used in this chapter, ‘occupational disease’ means any
20 disease or infection arising out of and in the course of employment caused
21 by substances or activities to which an employee is not ordinarily subjected
22 or exposed other than during a period of regular actual employment therein,
23 and which requires medical services or results in disability or death, in-
24 cluding:

25 “(A) Any disease or infection caused by ingestion of, absorption of,
26 inhalation of or contact with dust, fumes, vapors, gases, radiation or other
27 substances.

28 “(B) Any mental disorder, whether sudden or gradual in onset, which re-
29 quires medical services or results in physical or mental disability or death.

30 “(C) Any series of traumatic events or occurrences which requires medical

1 services or results in physical disability or death.

2 “(b) As used in this chapter, ‘mental disorder’ includes any physical dis-
3 order caused or worsened by mental stress.

4 “(2)(a) The worker must prove that employment conditions were the major
5 contributing cause of the disease.

6 “(b) If the occupational disease claim is based on the worsening of a
7 preexisting disease or condition pursuant to ORS 656.005 (7), the worker must
8 prove that employment conditions were the major contributing cause of the
9 combined condition and pathological worsening of the disease.

10 “(c) Occupational diseases shall be subject to all of the same limitations
11 and exclusions as accidental injuries under ORS 656.005 (7).

12 “(d) Existence of an occupational disease or worsening of a preexisting
13 disease must be established by medical evidence supported by objective
14 findings.

15 “(e) Preexisting conditions shall be deemed causes in determining major
16 contributing cause under this section.

17 “(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a mental disor-
18 der is not compensable under this chapter unless the worker establishes all
19 of the following:

20 “(a) The employment conditions producing the mental disorder exist in a
21 real and objective sense.

22 “(b) The employment conditions producing the mental disorder are condi-
23 tions other than conditions generally inherent in every working situation or
24 reasonable disciplinary, corrective or job performance evaluation actions by
25 the employer, or cessation of employment or employment decisions attendant
26 upon ordinary business or financial cycles.

27 “(c) There is a diagnosis of a mental or emotional disorder which is gen-
28 erally recognized in the medical or psychological community.

29 “(d) There is clear and convincing evidence that the mental disorder arose
30 out of and in the course of employment.

1 “(4) Death, disability or impairment of health of firefighters of any poli-
2 tical division who have completed five or more years of employment as fire-
3 fighters, caused by any disease of the lungs or respiratory tract, hypertension
4 or cardiovascular-renal disease, and resulting from their employment as
5 firefighters is an ‘occupational disease.’ Any condition or impairment of
6 health arising under this subsection shall be presumed to result from a
7 firefighter’s employment. However, any such firefighter must have taken a
8 physical examination upon becoming a firefighter, or subsequently thereto,
9 which failed to reveal any evidence of such condition or impairment of
10 health which preexisted employment. Denial of a claim for any condition or
11 impairment of health arising under this subsection must be on the basis of
12 clear and convincing medical evidence that the cause of the condition or
13 impairment is unrelated to the firefighter’s employment.

14 “(5)(a) Death, disability or impairment of health of a nonvolunteer fire-
15 fighter employed by a political division or subdivision who has completed
16 five or more years of employment as a nonvolunteer firefighter is an occu-
17 pational disease if the death, disability or impairment of health:

18 “(A) Is caused by brain cancer, colon cancer, stomach cancer, testicular
19 cancer, prostate cancer, multiple myeloma, non-Hodgkin’s lymphoma, cancer
20 of the throat or mouth, rectal cancer, breast cancer or leukemia;

21 “(B) Results from the firefighter’s employment as a nonvolunteer fire-
22 fighter; and

23 “(C) Is first diagnosed by a physician after July 1, 2009.

24 “(b) Any condition or impairment of health arising under this subsection
25 is presumed to result from the firefighter’s employment. Denial of a claim for
26 any condition or impairment of health arising under this subsection must be
27 on the basis of clear and convincing medical evidence that the condition or
28 impairment was not caused or contributed to in material part by the
29 firefighter’s employment.

30 “(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subsection, the presumption

1 established under paragraph (b) of this subsection may be rebutted by clear
2 and convincing evidence that the use of tobacco by the nonvolunteer fire-
3 fighter is the major contributing cause of the cancer.

4 “(d) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection
5 does not apply to prostate cancer if the cancer is first diagnosed by a phy-
6 sician after the firefighter has reached the age of 55. However, nothing in
7 this paragraph affects the right of a firefighter to establish the
8 compensability of prostate cancer without benefit of the presumption.

9 “(e) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection
10 does not apply to claims filed more than 84 months following the termination
11 of the nonvolunteer firefighter’s employment as a nonvolunteer firefighter.
12 However, nothing in this paragraph affects the right of a firefighter to es-
13 tablish the compensability of the cancer without benefit of the presumption.

14 “(f) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection
15 does not apply to volunteer firefighters.

16 “(g) Nothing in this subsection affects the provisions of subsection (4) of
17 this section.

18 “(h) For purposes of this subsection, ‘nonvolunteer firefighter’ means a
19 firefighter who performs firefighting services and receives salary, hourly
20 wages equal to or greater than the state minimum wage, or other compen-
21 sation except for room, board, lodging, housing, meals, stipends, reimburse-
22 ment for expenses or nominal payments for time and travel, regardless of
23 whether any such compensation is subject to federal, state or local taxation.
24 ‘Nominal payments for time and travel’ includes, but is not limited to, pay-
25 ments for on-call time or time spent responding to a call or similar noncash
26 benefits.

27 “(6) Notwithstanding ORS 656.027 (6), any city providing a disability and
28 retirement system by ordinance or charter for firefighters and police officers
29 not subject to this chapter shall apply the presumptions established under
30 subsection (5) of this section when processing claims for firefighters covered

1 by the system.

2 “(7)(a) As used in this subsection:

3 “(A) ‘Acute stress disorder’ has the meaning given that term in the
4 DSM-5.

5 “(B) ‘Covered employee’ means an individual who, on the date a claim is
6 filed under this chapter:

7 “(i) Was employed for at least five years by, or experienced a single
8 traumatic event that satisfies the criteria set forth in the DSM-5 as Criterion
9 A for diagnosing post-traumatic stress disorder while employed by, the state,
10 a political subdivision of the state, a special government body, as defined in
11 ORS 174.117, or a public agency in any of these occupations:

12 “(I) A full-time paid firefighter;

13 “(II) A full-time paid emergency medical services provider;

14 “(III) A full-time paid police officer;

15 “(IV) A full-time paid corrections officer or youth correction officer;

16 “(V) A full-time paid parole and probation officer; or

17 “(VI) A full-time paid emergency dispatcher or 9-1-1 emergency operator;

18 and

19 “(ii) Remains employed in an occupation listed in sub-subparagraph (i) of
20 this subparagraph or separated from employment in the occupation not more
21 than seven years previously.

22 “(C) ‘DSM-5’ means the fifth edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical
23 Manual of Mental Disorders published by the American Psychiatric Associ-
24 ation.

25 “(D) ‘Post-traumatic stress disorder’ has the meaning given that term in
26 the DSM-5.

27 “(E) ‘Psychiatrist’ means a psychiatrist whom the Oregon Medical Board
28 has licensed and certified as eligible to diagnose the conditions described in
29 this subsection.

30 “(F) ‘Psychologist’ means a licensed psychologist, as defined in ORS

1 675.010, whom the Oregon Board of Psychology has certified as eligible to
2 diagnose the conditions described in this subsection.

3 “(b) Notwithstanding subsections (2) and (3) of this section, if a covered
4 employee establishes through a preponderance of persuasive medical evidence
5 from a psychiatrist or psychologist that the covered employee has more
6 likely than not satisfied the diagnostic criteria in the DSM-5 for post-
7 traumatic stress disorder or acute stress disorder, any resulting death, disa-
8 bility or impairment of health of the covered employee shall be presumed to
9 be compensable as an occupational disease. An insurer or **the State Acci-
10 dent Insurance Fund Corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured employer,
11 may rebut the presumption only by establishing through clear and convinc-
12 ing medical evidence that duties as a covered employee were not of real im-
13 portance or great consequence in causing the diagnosed condition.

14 “(c) An insurer’s **acceptance**, or [*self-insured employer’s*] **the
15 corporation’s acceptance on behalf of a self-insured employer**, of a claim
16 of post-traumatic stress disorder or acute stress disorder under this sub-
17 section, whether the acceptance was voluntary or was a result of a judgment
18 or order, does not preclude the insurer or the self-insured employer from
19 later denying the current compensability of the claim if exposure as a cov-
20 ered employee to trauma that meets the diagnostic criteria set forth as Cri-
21 terion A in the DSM-5 for post-traumatic stress disorder or acute stress
22 disorder ceases being of real importance or great consequence in causing the
23 disability, impairment of health or a need for treatment.

24 “(d) An insurer or **the corporation, on behalf of a** self-insured
25 employer, may deny a claim under paragraph (c) of this subsection only on
26 the basis of clear and convincing medical evidence.

27 “(e) Notwithstanding ORS 656.027 (6), a city that provides a disability or
28 retirement system for firefighters and police officers by ordinance or charter
29 that is not subject to this chapter, when accepting and processing claims for
30 death, disability or impairment of health from firefighters and police officers

1 covered by the disability or retirement system, shall apply:

2 “(A) The provisions of this subsection; and

3 “(B) For claims filed under this subsection, the time limitations for filing
4 claims that are set forth in ORS 656.807 (1) and (2).

5 **“SECTION 23. The amendments to ORS 656.206, 656.218, 656.245,
6 656.247, 656.262, 656.264, 656.267, 656.268, 656.273, 656.277, 656.278, 656.283,
7 656.313, 656.325, 656.327, 656.331, 656.403, 656.407, 656.455, 656.752, 656.780
8 and 656.802 by sections 1 to 22 of this 2021 Act apply to claims that
9 workers submit to self-insured employers on and after the effective
10 date of this 2021 Act.**

11 **“SECTION 24. This 2021 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the
12 date on which the 2021 regular session of the Eighty-first Legislative
13 Assembly adjourns sine die.”.**
